Health & Wellness

First United Methodist Church and Penn State Extension will be teaming up again to offer the **StrongWomen/Growing Stronger Program** this fall. This is a 12-week program geared for middle-aged to older women **and men** and is based upon years of research on how strength training and proper nutrition improve the health of women and men of all ages. The program was developed to help individuals increase their strength, bone density, balance and energy and help them look and feel better. Participants will meet two times a week for one hour sessions. There is a \$90 fee for this program and participants may want to provide their own hand weights and ankle weights.

The evening classes will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays, September 8 – December 1, 7:00 – 8:00 p.m., in Room B-003. Mandatory paperwork must be completed in order to participate in the program and individuals over age 70 must get a doctor's permission. Past participants must preregister.

Facilities

First Church's office wing has seen a flurry of activity in the past month. Rooms 102 (Little Friends Nursery School Director), 103 (Juniper Tree Counseling Center), 104 (Facilities Manager), 105 (Helping Hands classroom) and the first floor restroom were all painted consistent with the color scheme (i.e., Cinnamon Whip, accented by Chutney Brown) of the church office. The first floor (and second floor) hallways were painted a soothing Green Tea color. The Green Tea paint was also used as an accent color in the painting of room 203 (Finance Director), 204 (Associate Pastor), 207 (conference area) and the second floor restroom where Desert Powder was used as the primary color. Judi Buddenbaum and Kristin Brown deserve the lion's share of credit for this painting facelift, with an assist from Tina/Josh Eaton and Janice/Heather/Maya Bowen. Thanks also to George Canonizado for his tireless efforts in moving "stuff" around so the painting could happen. Everything looks great!

Speaking of great, have you noticed the shine on the tile floors in the narthex, Gathering Area, first floor of the education wing, and various rooms/hallways in the lower level of the office wing? A slight slowdown in daily activities around the facility for the summer has afforded George an opportunity to spruce those floors up and really make them shine. Awesome effort on his part!

Settlement on the properties the church owned at 118 & 120 West Keller Street occurred on 20 June, so we are now officially out of the landlord business. Thank you to the entire congregation for your prayerful support during this process. Based on Administrative Board approval at their June meeting of a recommendation from the Trustees, the net proceeds from the sale of the Keller Street properties are being applied to the existing church debt as we strive to eliminate that debt altogether and plan for the future.

Special thanks also to Eric King for his efforts inside and outside the building over the past month. Eric completed the removal process of the stair treads in the Frederick Street stairwell from the main floor down to Fellowship Hall. I am in the process of measuring, cutting and "dry-fitting" the new treads for this stairwell, with a stated goal of having all of this work done before Vacation Bible School is held in early August. Eric also patched and painted an area in the ceiling of the Christian Fellowship classroom that had been damaged by an earlier roof leak. In addition, Eric sprayed for weeds and constantly cleans up brush in the gravel and paved areas of our parking lots to keep things looking sharp around our exterior. Thank you, good and faithful servant!

Nail Construction completed another phase of our iron railing restoration initiative, this time two small railings (and one concrete step) along King Alley near Frederick Street and a railing at the steps outside the back corner of the Guyer classroom. Nail Construction is now restoring the railings in the exterior stairwells that run from ground level to the back sides of Fellowship Hall and the Music Room.

The Borough's Highway Department recently filled the large potholes in King Alley for the second time this year. A more permanent fix of the King Alley surface is not in the Borough's plans at this time. Sorry!

Things are happening. Projects are getting done. Please keep me apprised if you see something that needs fixed or improved so that we can focus on making our facility welcoming and inviting to all who enter.
