From the Pastor

I was passing through the lobby of a local hospital last week. A man watching the television in the corner was repeating these words: "Not another one...not another one..." It only took a moment for me to see that the news report was of yet another school shooting somewhere in the United States. I instantly identified with the disbelief, the sadness and the helplessness I felt through the words of that man in the lobby.

As I left the hospital and drove on to my next stop, I found myself going over the words of Martin Luther King which have been burned into my memory since my "The ultimate days in school: weakness of violence is that it is a descending spiral, begetting the very thing it seeks to destroy. Instead of diminishing evil, it multiplies it. Through violence you may murder the liar, but you cannot murder the lie. nor establish the truth. Through violence you murder the hater, but you do not murder hate. In fact, violence merely increases hate.... Returning violence for violence multiplies violence, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate:

Only love can do that."

We live in a time where the distance which separates hate and violence has diminished to a mere step. We live in a time where the distance which separates anger and violence has diminished to a mere glance. We live in a time where the distance which separates disappointment and violence has diminished to a mere thought.

We live in a time when it is much more urgent than it has ever been that we embrace the difficult and challenging teaching of our Savior and align our actions with his:

'You have heard that it was said, "An eve for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." But I say to you, Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile. Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you.

FOR MANY YEARS, First Church has supported the Sierra Leone Well Drilling Project, a special mission project of the Susquehanna Conference. One of the avenues of support is with donations from the Penny Bucket which is located in the narthex. One hundred percent (100%) of your donations are used to provide training and dig wells that supply safe drinking water for schools and communities in Sierra Leone.

There were 2,582 pennies contributed since February for a total to date of \$12,057,70.



s I prepare to celebrate our nation's birth. I have been thinking a lot about our beginnings. It must have been either desperation or a sense of adventure that brought settlers to the New World. I have been watching **Turn**, the AMC drama about Revolutionary spies and the depiction of everyday colony life. Life was difficult—yet we know they fought every day to make a better place for themselves and their children. The library's new historical fiction trilogy, The Daughters of Harwood House, introduces three English sisters who come to the New World as indentured servants in order to keep their father out of debtors' prison. Each is taken separately into a different part of the untamed American Colonies.

In the first book. Rose's **Pledge.** Rose is sold to a grubby trader and taken into Indian territory. Nate Kinyon tags along because he is attracted to Rose and hopes to save her from being sold to the Indians or worse. But though Rose is also attracted to Nate, Rose's deep Christian faith prevents her from falling in love with a Godless This book is filled not man. only with history, but romance and suspense that will keep you up past your bedtime and be glad that you checked out the next book of the trilogy at the same time.

Mariah's Ouest is set in Baltimore in 1753. She has been indentured into the Barclay

house where there is an eligible bachelor, Colin, and a domineering mother. As she works about the house, she thinks about all the ways she can become more of an eligible bride and less of a servant. While Colin may come to see her more as a person, his mother wants him to marry someone of his own social class. Find out if Mariah can let God lead her to the right path for her life.

Lily's plight is set in Pennsylvania during the time of the French and Indian War. When her mistress's husband. John returns home on a short furlough, Lily finds herself falling in love with him. But Lily is a good Christian lass and does not want to cross any boundaries. But times are harrowing and it would be nice to have a broad chest to lean on....

The library has many historical fiction books, but if you prefer to read books set in present day, come into the library, and we will help you find just the right book for you.

Mental Health First Aid

Sometimes, first aid isn't a bandage, or CPR, or the Heimlich, or calling 911.

Sometimes, first aid is YOU!

You are more likely to encounter someone — friend, family member, coworker, neighbor, or member of the community — in an emotional or mental crisis than someone having a heart attack. Mental Health First Aid teaches a 5-step action plan to offer initial help to people with the signs and symptoms of a mental problem or crisis, and connect them with the appropriate professional, peer, social, or self help care. Anyone can take the 8hour Mental Health First Aid course — first responders, students, teachers, leaders of faith communities, human resources professionals, and caring citizens.

First Church will be hosting a Youth Mental Health First Aid Course, Thursday, September 25, 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. This is an 8-hour public course for adults living or working with youth ages 11-18 and for senior high school students.

Facilities Update

Pastor Lucretia's departure has set off a daisy chain of Facilities efforts at First Church. We are consolidating the Juniper Tree Pastoral Counseling Services offices in room 103, Pastor Lucretia's old office. Juniper Tree, staffed by Glenn Covert and Janet Hensel, will continue to provide counseling services out of our facility. I am moving into room 104, the other first floor office formerly used by Juniper Tree. Pastor David Reed's office will be in my former second floor location, room 204. This will enable all of our pastors and program staff (i.e., Adult Ministry, Congregational Care, Children's Ministry, and Youth Ministry) to be in close proximity to each other on the second floor of the office wing, which we hope will improve the synergy of our ministry efforts. We are doing some much-needed room painting and carpet cleaning as we make these office moves, freshening things up for the new occupants. We will also be freshening up rooms 102 (Little Friend Nursery School office) and 105 (Helping Hands classroom) in the same color scheme we've been using in the other first floor offices: that effort will take place once we get everything in place from this initial flurry of activity. A special thanks to Judi Buddenbaum and George Canonizado for their efforts during these moves.

Settlement on the recently auctioned duplex residential properties the Church owned at 118 and 120 West Keller Street

(next to the church parking lot) should occur before the end of June. The Trustees met with Finance Chair Bob Bittenbender to discuss options for the disposition of the proceeds from these properties, weighing the benefits of building up our parsonage escrow account at Conference (Note: we had used proceeds from the sale of the former parsonage on Darla Road to pay off the debt on the Keller Street properties and, in accordance with the Book of Discipline, we need to set aside an equivalent amount of funds in the event we need to provide a parsonage to an assigned pastor) or paying down the existing church debt to reduce our ongoing interest payments. Final decision on that action will be determined by First Church's Administrative Board.

Progress is being made on a number of other facilities issues around our building. Our network wiring expansion is almost complete, thanks to the hard work of James Paris. Wiring was recently run to room 216 (Kid's Worship area) and Fellowship Hall, in addition to the library, youth lounge, and conference room 207 that I reported on last month. We still need to make some connections at our central network controls to get everything operational, but we're close to finishing this initiative. Eric King has been hard at work removing the broken stair treads in the last stairwell we're repairing, coming down from the Frederick Street

entrance to Fellowship Hall. Then I need to get busy installing the new treads in that stairwell. We'll all be thrilled when that project is completed. Nail Construction is in the process of restoring two more of our old iron railings, this time along King Alley near Frederick Street. There will be some concrete repairs made to the steps where these railings were removed when they are ready to be reinstalled. Thank you again to Kristin Brown for her ongoing efforts in creating content for the tower hallway video system; it is really helping to keep everyone entering through the tower entrance informed on what is going on at First Church.

A lot is happening around the First Church facility. Keep your eyes alert to these improvements, and be sure to let me know how you can help make things even better for everyone who walks through our doors.
