From the Pastor

"A tree is best measured when it is down." That's the title of the last chapter of Carl Sandburg's monumental biography of Abraham Lincoln. Sandburg says that upon his death, people no longer thought of Lincoln's unpolished manner, his political attitudes, his simple faith, his all too human failings. As he lay in death, the people saw his great human virtues, and underneath all his virtues and behind all his political decisions ran a continuing thread of courage: he acted not out of political expediency, but out of a sense of what he truly believed to be right.

It has been said that of all the virtues we hold dear in western civilization, courage is the most basic. "Unless one has courage," Samuel Johnson said, "there is no security for preserving any other virtue." Of what use is wisdom, if one hasn't courage to act wisely? Of what value is love, if one hasn't courage to make oneself vulnerable? Of what result is truth, if one hasn't courage to speak it? Of what consequence is faith, if one hasn't courage to embrace it? No virtue can stand without the underpinning of courage.

Jesus was an immensely wise man: I often marvel at his insights. He was a loving man, never denying anyone access to him. He was honest and righteous and faithful, so much so that we still strive to imitate him. Providing the foundation to all of these, though, was courage...phenomenal courage. The longer I live and the more I learn, the more I am impressed with Jesus' courage. So many things were stacked against him, yet he persevered, even thrived in communicating his message, doing his work and living a commendable life.

There are lots of folks who struggle with that every day...keeping going while the odds are stacked against them. If you are Christian the odds are stacked against you: there is no assumption of respect for the Church or for Christians as once there was, there is not as much value placed on our convictions and our work, and in the culture at large Christians are much more an object of ridicule than of respect. It takes some courage to go on.

If you are married the odds are stacked against you: there is no assumption of respect for the marriage covenant or for marriage partners as once there was. Whereas once it was assumed that spouses were faithful to one another physically and emotionally, now it is an act of courage to be so.

It's an act of courage to express yourself. We communicate more than ever, but we don't know how to talk to one another face to face. We are fearful of our jobs and positions, careful about what we say even to family members, uneasy expressing our convictions to people we don't know. More and more it requires courage just to express your convictions and your values.

"A tree is best measured when it is down." We can assess the courage of a life-

time when a courageous person has died. But courage is a living thing. It says "no" when "no" needs to be said. It says "enough" when others are in pain. It says "help" when there is a need. It says "stop" and stands in the way when others are mistreated. Courage says "I" when "I" needs to be said, but denies itself prestige and comfort when others are speaking. Courage says "listen" when someone needs to be heard, but also remains quiet to do its own listening.

I live and work among courageous people, and I am grateful because doing so gives me more courage than I have within me.

Library

October in the library is mystery month. Actually, for me, every month is mystery month as that is my favorite genre. The library has many excellent mystery writers –Ronie Kendig, Terri Blackstock, Robin Carroll, and Dani Pettry just to name a few. Amish writers such as Vannetta Chapman have started writing mysteries. But this month, I want to feature Lynnette Eason.

Ms. Eason has several series on our shelf, all of them based around strong women who find themselves "in a pickle". In her latest series, *Hidden Identity*, her first book **No One to Trust** is the same formula. The main character, Summer Abernathy wakes up one morning to find her husband Kyle missing and three men in her home intent on finding him. She had met the man she knows as Kyle in the line at the bank who at that time he said he was a computer programmer. While searching for her husband and the item the men are adamant about retrieving, Summer finds herself plunged into the world of organized crime. Uncovering lie after lie, Summer wonders if she can ever trust Kyle again or if their marriage can survive so much deceit. Meanwhile, Kyle is on the run trying to hide from the mob and trying to protect Summer. This book will keep you turning the pages till long after your bedtime.

Next in the series is **No Where to Turn**. Danielle Harding takes her son, Simon, and flees from her abusive husband, Kurt. Relieved that they are safe, Danielle learns later that Kurt is dead. He had stolen something important from someone willing to kill to reclaim his property. With Kurt dead the next person on the killer's list is Danielle. Not knowing what to do or where to go, she hires Adam Buchanan of Operation Refuge. Adam has been waiting for a case to solve, and this seems like a case he can not only sink his teeth into, but also aid a family that desperately needs his help.

While waiting for the third book in the series, you might want to sample some of our other intriguing suspense novels.

Facilities

Have you been enjoying the beautiful fall weather as much as I have? There is just something special about warm, sunny days and cool, crisp nights! God is good! All of the time!

Activity has certainly picked up around the church lately. Committee meetings, music/choir rehearsals, 3G, Bible studies, a new school year for Little Friends, New Hope Ministries after school program, Al-Anon, Covered in Love, cub scouts, junior girl scouts, MixFit Fitness, Narcotics Anonymous, Strong Women, and Zumba Gold have this place hopping from morning to night. Thanks to our Office Manager, Kristin Brown, for keeping the schedule straight so we can accommodate as many groups as possible each week, and to custodians George Canonizado and Matt Miller for keeping the building clean and inviting to all.

I wish I could report completion of the ongoing stair tread replacement project. Unfortunately, I still have one tread to install at the bottom of the Frederick Street stairwell. Members of the Trustees gave me a lot of ideas on how to engineer the installation of that last tread, so I'm hoping that by the time you read this newsletter the project will be completed. We've been painting all of the woodwork in that stairwell, and will be painting the walls after we do some much-needed patch work.

Nail Construction is working on the last phase of our iron railing restoration project, the ground level railings protecting persons from falling into the exterior stairwells on the Frederick Street side of the facility. I hope you've taken notice of the quality workmanship of the railings that have already been restored around the church, and are as excited as I am about the impending completion of that initiative.

I addressed the sinking condition in the corner of the parking lot next to the property we recently sold at 120 West Keller Street in the September newsletter. Neidig, Inc. will be digging open the parking lot in that area in the near future so we can determine whether we have additional decaying and settling of fill in what was the foundation of properties that were formerly along West Keller Street or an actual sinkhole. Please continue to use extreme caution when you are in that corner of the church parking lot until we can rectify the problem. Thanks.

The weeping cherry tree near the corner of King Alley and Frederick Street, planted a number of years ago in memory of former First Church youth member Brian James, is diseased and needs to be cut down. There also are some problems with the holly bushes in the area between the tower and office entrances on the west side of the building, perhaps the aftermath of the extremely harsh 2013-14 winter we suffered through. We are formulating a plan for addressing these landscaping issues, and hope to tackle them soon since "fall is for planting".

One final item I want to address is noise. We have two noise issues we're working on: a bad fan motor on the reach-in refrigerator in the church kitchen and a persistent "hum" from our sound system in the sanctuary. Please be assured that we are working as quickly as possible to resolve both of these issues and restore things to normal operations.

"What's the Rush?"

Please join us in the Multi-purpose room on October 12 for our Health Lecture - "What's the Rush? Trends in Stroke Care". With the increase in children and youth having strokes Kathy Morrison, RN will share what we know about strokes: what puts us at risk, what the signs of stroke are, and what we can do about it.

Kathy is the Stroke Program Manager for the Penn State Hershey Medical Center, one of 70 Joint Commission Certified Comprehensive Stroke Centers in the United States. Kathy is a published author in the area of stroke care and she facilitates a regional stroke survivor support group.

2014/2015 Flu Vaccines Available

The Visiting Nurse Association of Central PA. will be administering flu shots on Sunday, October 12 in the church library and Sunday, November 9 in the multipurpose room from 9 am to 11 am.

The 2014/2015 flu shot is a Quadrivalent formula, meaning it contains 4 strains of influenza virus (California A, Texas A, Massachusetts B and Brisbane B) that the CDC has selected to be the worst during the upcoming flu season.

The cost of the shot will be \$35 (cash or check accepted).

Medicare will be billed for individuals who are Medicare Part B eligible.
