"Gratitude"

One beautiful autumn Sunday morning, when I was serving First UMC, Hanover, Betsy's parents came to worship. After church, her Dad rode home with me. As we were enjoying the magnificent fall colors along the tree lined streets, Dad looked at me and said, "Dennis, your lines have fallen in pleasant places." Dad was right. I looked at our neighborhood and our congregation and our family and I realized how very blessed I was.

The verse Dad quoted to me in the car that day has been important to me ever since:

The Lord is my chosen portion and my cup; you hold my lot.

The boundary lines have fallen for me in pleasant places;

I have a goodly heritage. (Psalm 16:5-6)

The Hebrews that first sang this psalm were called to remember God's faithfulness to their ancestors. After forty years in the desert, they had moved into the land the Lord their God had given them. Elders cast lots and apportioned the land among the twelve tribes, setting up "boundary lines" to designate the portion given to each tribe.

We can only imagine the joy of those who first settled in this new land as each moved into the portion allotted to them. They were the children and grandchildren of Egyptian slaves. They had spent their entire lives up until then living in tents in the desert. Now they had the freedom to build homes, raise families and establish communities. On their land they could enjoy meaningful work, graze sheep, goats, and cattle, and plant and harvest food. To them, every plot of land must have seemed a most "pleasant place." Their leaders reminded them to **be grateful**. It was all a gift from God.

Remembering their story, this psalm invites us to take time every day to survey the landscape of our lives, to see all that God has so abundantly bestowed upon us, and to **be grateful**. Your lines have fallen in pleasant places.

Of course, the "pleasant places" that have fallen within the "boundary lines" of our lives are more than property and possessions. The psalmist declares, "The Lord is my chosen portion and my cup." In addition to the material blessings he has received, his "goodly heritage" is filled with spiritual blessings. He might have written, with the apostle John:

From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. (John 1:9)

Life is not always pleasant and yet what my father-in-law said of me all those years ago could be said of you, too. Your lines have fallen in pleasant places. What spiritual blessings have you found along your path? How have you experienced God's grace? **Be grateful!**

I cannot thank God enough for you!

September: arrival in Rome, Italy

Every student. Every campus. Every nation.

This last month has been packed with change, transition, and so many good things. I'm excited to share, and so thankful for your partnership!

Where do I start? This month: I landed in Italy, I've lived in 3 apartments, I am building a home in a new country, I'm learning a new language, I spend time with students on campus, I live 4,500 miles from my parents, I moved in with new roommates, I'm learning a different way of life and culture, and I live in Italy! It's all been so crazy. A few things are for sure: Italy and America are a lot different, and I am very american. God is sovereign, good and totally providing for me in the biggest ways. I'm learning a lot. I am so thankful you're in this with me. I'm convinced your prayers changed this month to go better than it would have otherwise.

Overall, staff life in Italy is very multi-faceted. Mainly, I focus on campus and human resources. For campus, we have 2 campus teams and are praying that students would lead these teams on their respective campuses. La Sapienza is the largest university in Europe, and Roma Tre is our secondary campus due to the contact we have there with a few professors. Overall, we want to find students that love Jesus, and coach and encourage them to multiple their lives. We have huge dreams for Rome.

One of my favorite things so far about Rome has been the local church: San Lorenzo

San Lorenzo is a body of mainly Italian believing and seeking people to see what following Jesus means, and
to worship if they choose to do so. It is a beautiful body of believers. It is SO ENCOURAGING as a missionary
to have a church body where I can see natives who love Jesus and want to make Him known. While its
encouraging, it also shows how much Jesus is needed in this place. We have around 120 attendees in our
church, and I now see that what a friend of mine has said for a long time is true: If an Italian comes to know
and love Jesus, they will tell everyone they know. Ministry here is very strategic.

As we go on campus, we spark spiritual conversations using various tools, in response to "How would describe God right now in your life?" students responded:

 * These are paraphrased, because they are translated from Italian to English

One picture to describe my life is an airplane, I want to escape it, I don't have a purpose and I would leave, even this moment. - Roma Tre student

I think there is a higher power, but I'd rather die, and let where I'm going be a mystery. -La Sap Student

I want to encounter God, but then I have doubts and I'm just not sure. There is something holding me back - Roma Tre student

These students have varying replies, but other than the students we already knew from campus, we have yet to meet another Christian. To us, this is such a foreign concept. God is doing a lot here, which creates a clear tension of also acknowledging the reality that few people know Jesus or have ever heard what He's done for them.

Vision for Rome:

At the beginning of September, we met with campus staff from throughout Italy. It is such a privilege to be in a room with Italians working for Agape, and foreigners being called here to do the same. We've met several other people through the community that have moved to Rome with the same vision as Agape, and it confirms that God is doing huge things here. Would you pray with me that we would take advantage of this time, where Romans are fighting for the gospel, churches are partnering and there is momentum in student leadership in a way that hasn't happened recently here in ministry.

Thank you for praying 8 being in partnership with me for how God is at work in Rome!

Prayer requests

- Team unity and transition: It is still a lot of adjustment living with new people, in a new place. Everything here is more difficult. Things I can do in America with ease may not even be possible here.
- Students here to come to know Jesus; to know He wants to know them; to have hope that this culture can experience God, even though they've turned so far from him in general.
- Continued Cultural specific prayers:
 Friends, Praying to feel like an insider,
 and find a sense of belonging
- Language learning. It is harder than I could imagine to live in a place where my communication is about as much as a 2-3 year old. Hardly anyone around me speaks english. Prayers for language learning and acquisition
- Our team is multicultural, and we are learning that communication, trust, and expression are so different. Would you pray we'd understand each other in a way that unifies us further?
- Believing students at Roma Tre or students that come to believe, so they can begin the movement with us

Praises

- My days have some normalcy and I can see the Lord stringing together life here, verses chaos! Our home is coming together slowly but surely...
- Students at La Sapienza have taken ownership and the beginnings of a movement is starting. Its beautiful, and allows us to dream about going to a new campus part time.
- God has given us ease into so many things that logistically could have gone so differently



New Date for the Sleep Out!

Every Thanksgiving eve for over 25 years the First United Methodist youth department has held its annual Sleep-out to support the homeless in the Mechanicsburg area. While this event has shifted and transformed its look over the years, the impact has continued to be unmeasurable! Our students become aware of the realities that surround homelessness, they grow in their gratitude for what they have, a new sense of purpose is instilled in them regarding what they personally can do to help others, and our local agencies helping those experiencing homelessness are the benefactors of the money we raise.

As we approach the Sleep Out for the Homeless this year, we are once again making a change. Over the past several years we have struggled with the primary task of the students attending the Sleep Out: money collection on the street. The street is still there and money slowly trickles in, but traffic has slowly dissipated. We have tried starting early, we have tried to advertise online giving, but with many schools now off on Thanksgiving eve, the holiday traffic has already passed by Simpson Street. In hopes to re-engage our event with traffic flow we are shifting the Sleep Out to the weekend before Thanksgiving. We are excited to be once again a traffic stopping presence to the drivers along Simpson street and allow so many more to participate in giving to the Homeless.



A great perk of this change is that other churches are able to join us! The involvement of additional youth ministries has waned over the years and many have explained that having an event the night before a holiday is just "not in the DNA of their church members." By shifting the date, other students who previously missed the event due to holiday travels are now able to experience a night out in our cardboard community. This year we will see Mechanicsburg Brethren in Christ and Shephardstown UMC join us. The addition of participants also means we have the ability to expand collection on some of the other main throughways in town like York and Market Streets. And who isn't excited to know that their child will not fall asleep into their plate of mashed potatoes because they were not up all night the day before Thanksgiving?

We are excited to continue in this tradition and are grateful for the opportunities to make needed changes so as to allow this event to carry on for many more years to come! Please help us in spreading the word that the Sleep Out is happening on a new day! Please stop by and share your lose change and support to the youth sleeping out in cardboard boxes on Friday November 17- Saturday November 18, 2017.

What is the Sleep-out?

- A night for youth to experience the realities of homelessness
- An educational opportunity to shed light on homelessness
- A chance to financially benefit local help agencies (like New Hope, Family Promise, Bethesda Mobile Mission, etc) through street collections

How can you be involved as an adult?

- Adult supervision is needed throughout all hours of the Sleep Out. We need help on the street, at registration, in the soup kitchen, and as extra eyes keeping our students safe. (Clearances are needed in order to help).
- We always need soup, crackers, and hot chocolate to feed the participants in our soup kitchen.

We are now in what I call the "wind tunnel season". But not even the weather channel has heard of it because I made it up. And actually you may not know this, but we all have been in this season since the middle of October. I began to feel the wind picking up when stores started to display their Christmas decorations right after Labor Day. You will know you are in this season too, if you feel blown in every direction and more work keeps blowing into your hands. Because I know about this phenomenon, I am reviewing Christmas novellas this month, because by December it will be impossible to sit down and read anything. And these books are too good to miss. I hope that explained my thought process.

The Beloved Christmas Quilt: Three Stories of Families, Romance and Amish Faith is very unique in that it is written by three generations of women from the Brunstetter family. Each story centers around an heirloom quilt with the scripture of Psalms 31:3 embroidered on its back - For thou art my rock and my fortress; therefore for thy name's sake lead me, and guide me. Wanda Brunstetter, a longtime favorite in our library, writes the first story Luella's Promise. When Luella is caring for a dying woman, she is given this beautiful quilt, but must promise to one day pass it down to a daughter. Unmarried Luella isn't sure she will ever meet the right man. Jean Brunstetter, Wanda's daughter-in-law, carries the theme into Karen's Gift. Karen Allgyer and her husband have moved away from her family and Karen misses them. With three little girls and another child on the way, Karen doesn't know how she can manage without the help of her mother and sisters. Find out how the heirloom quilt finds its way into Karen's life. Richelle Brunstetter, granddaughter of Wanda, finishes the book with the story Rosanna's Groom. Rosanna Allgyer has the unexpected disaster on her wedding day. How can she go on? This heartwarming story trilogy will take you out of the wind tunnel into the valley of tranquility.

Another Christmas book is **An Amish Christmas Love: Four Novellas.** These four romances are written by some of your favorite authors—Beth Wiseman, Ruth Reid, Kelly Irvin, and Amy Clipston. If you like Christmas Amish love stories, this is the perfect holiday read. Short enough to be read in small bursts of time, but with enough holiday charm to keep you smiling all day.

But if you are like me, you need more adrenalin in your books. Don't worry. The library has all the latest mysteries on the shelf to compete with that wind tunnel feeling. We also have Advent books to deepen your devotional life and get you set for the true meaning of Christmas. Come in and let us help you find just the right book.

Access Ministry

WHAT IS ACCESS MINISTRY?

I am so glad you asked! Sometimes we forget that not everyone knows what the Access Ministry Team does. We are a team of individuals focused on making the church accessible to all God's children, making First Church accessible to all individuals, and reaching out to the disAbled community and their families. This is a lofty goal that is often reached in small steps.

In a perfect world, all God's children would worship together. There would be no division in the body of Christ. In the real world, we know that a disability or a special need can cause separation and/or isolation. According to some data from the Irresistible Church series, up to 90% of individuals with a significant disability are not connected to a church. And in most cases their family isn't connected either. Access Ministry has sponsored two programs specifically aimed for the disAbled community.

Monthly we host a Rejoicing Spirits worship service on the 4th Sunday at 4 pm. This service is designed to be inclusive for all abilities! It is open to all faiths and is a wonderful complement to anyone's spiritual life. Our Rejoicers have many opportunities to use their abilities to participate, get involved and praise the Lord. Come and join us whenever you can. A disability is not required to attend! You will find Rejoicers reading the Word, coming up front to sing in our choir, using a shaker to make a joyful noise, sharing a prayer, and offering our praises and concerns. Afterwards, we have a short time together for food and fellowship.

Once a year Access Ministry and First Church have hosted a Day of Pampering (DOP) event. This program reaches out to female caregivers who spend endless hours being the loving hands of Jesus on a daily basis as they care for their loved ones. DOP provides our guests an opportunity to spend the day focusing on worship, renewal, networking and being spoiled. Spoiling includes a beautiful sit down lunch (a luxury) and an afternoon of spa services including massage, nail painting, hair styling, makeup, relaxation techniques and so much more. These services are provided by many volunteers and local business people. DOP is a day to remind the women how special they are to God and for First Church to be the loving hands of Christ reaching out to his daughters. One of the highlights of the day is when each woman is invited to have her hands blessed so she may continue the hard work. When you ask a volunteer about their experience at DOP, be ready to catch the fever of serving God by serving these precious women!

In addition to our outreach focus, much time is spent making us more aware of accessibility. This can include having hand rails installed in a bathroom or providing a plan so a child can attend Sunday School class. Access Ministry works to resolve the issues keeping anyone from being a part of the Church family. We work to open all the doors for God's children. Together we can plan, prepare and worship God.
