From the Pastor's Desk...

The Windshield > The Rearview Mirror

At our annual church conference this fall Rev. Barry Robison, our district superintendent, shared a quote that I love: "There's a reason why a windshield is bigger than a rearview mirror. Where you're going is so much more important than where you've been."

When driving down the road, we should be looking forward most of the time and only glancing back us to change lanes, turn, or look for danger behind us. If we spend too much time staring at the rearview mirror, we'll miss out on the beauty ahead of us. Worse, we could get lost or even end up in a ditch!

What's true in driving, is also true in our lives. Many of us spend too much time looking back and not enough time looking ahead. We reminisce about happier days that are now behind us. We live as if the road out ahead of us will never match the beauty and opportunity of the road we've already traveled. Or, we revisit past hurts or relive past decisions and mistakes, letting them hold us back from enjoying the road ahead. The rearview mirror is close to the windshield, so it's easy to get distracted by it. But, the rearview mirror is also much smaller than the windshield. What we see in it is not nearly as clear and expansive as what we see through the windshield in front of us.

Jesus invites us to remember the past and learn from the past, but not to get stuck there. He goes before us, inviting us to treasure the good gifts of the past. He also invites us to let go of the hurts and failures we've experienced along the way, and to experience His healing and forgiveness. "Don't worry," He says, "I've got this."

Matthew recalls the scene in which Jesus calls his first disciples:

As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishers. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of people."

Immediately they left their nets and followed him.

Matthew 4:18-20

When they heard the call of Jesus, "Follow me," Simon Peter and Andrew immediately left their nets on the shoreline behind them so that they could follow Jesus into the future that lay ahead of them. Now, instead of fishing in the sea, they would become fishers of people.

If you're looking for a New Year's resolution, there isn't one better than this: "Follow me!" As you begin 2023, I encourage you to take your next step along the path of discipleship. Keep your eyes focused, looking through the windshield out ahead of you. See Jesus there, showing you the way to love God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength, and to love others as you have been loved by God. Remember, the windshield is so much bigger than the rearview mirror. Why? Because where you're going is so much more important than where you've been!

Happy New Year! Of course, I am writing this in December, and someone was kind enough to mention that Christmas is just THREE weeks from today. This article might be very short because I am having difficulty staying in this chair instead of running around prepping for the holidays. But, a couple of weeks ago, I ordered more books for the library. I'm thrilled to tell you about some of the new titles we have coming.

Kathy Harris is finishing up her "Deadly Secrets" series. Ironically, her third book, Deadly Conclusion, will



be on the shelf in January. Deadly Commitment and Deadly Connection are already available, but you don't necessarily need to read them in any order. The main character in this third book, Keely Lambert, trains German shepherds as search and rescue dogs. While training Titan, she is called to search for little Connor Wells, lost in Beaman Park in Tennessee. She is aided by Beau Gardner who is also in law enforcement and Connor's uncle. After finding Connor, Keely discovers something else half-hidden in the dirt: her father's military dog tags. The same father that disappeared more than twenty years ago. Determined to find out who murdered her father and aided by Beau, Keely begins to dig into the case. As the pair get close to the answer, the killer tries to stop them by kidnapping Keely's mother, killing Beau's father, and setting Keely's kennel on fire. But when Keely herself is kidnapped, nothing will stop Beau from finding her before there is another deadly conclusion. Reward yourself for surviving the Christmas season with this very suspenseful book!!

A newer author, but quickly becoming a favorite, is Julie Klassen. The Sisters of Sea View, first in the "On Devonshire Shores" series, finds Sarah Summers and her sisters destitute after their father's death. Determined to stay together and not lose the family home, they open their home as a guest house. The sisters assumed they would run the house for elderly invalids, but instead find themselves with a house full of fashionable gentlemen. Viola has some scars on her face and usually wears a veil to cover them. She decides to work outside the house and put her earnings toward a maid to cover her duties. One of her jobs is to read to a wounded officer in his thirties, and this new tasks opens some hidden emotional scars. Can she and the officer heal together? If this series holds

true, the each book will generally feature a different sister, but they will all exemplify the power of friendship, loyalty, love and new beginnings. I know it will be hard to wait for the next installment.

If you were too busy to read our Christmas collection in December, they are still available. The timeless book by Franklin Graham, Operation Christmas Child is a great read for all seasons. If you want to read about the impact the Christmas boxes make in the lives of children, the people who create each box, and the volunteers who distribute them, read this. It is a testimony of God's power in the simplest gift.





Receipts through the end of November were running short of our year-to-date estimate. As in prior years, we expect the Christmas season means financial support will pick up in December with strong attendance and members catching up on giving to meet their annual commitments.

Expenses year-to-date through November were favorable to the budget, but a bit more than our giving for the year, so far. The staff at First Church and its volunteers continue to be mindful stewards of the gifts of our congregation and are continuing their work to lead our congregation in opening doors to others for the Glory of God.

We have made a significant number of enhancements to our worship spaces during this past year. The most recent improvement is the new carpet, sound desk and fresh paint throughout the sanctuary. We are especially grateful for the significant contributions we have received to ensure the sanctuary and other improvements could occur in 2022.

We also want to thank all of you who participated in our Consecration Sunday and have submitted 2023 pledge cards to help us plan our outreach and service to the Lord in the coming year. We look forward to serving the Lord and continuing the mission of First Church, opening doors to celebrate the Christmas Season and spreading God's Word again in the New Year.
