From the Pastor

"Prayer in School"

Some of you may be old enough to remember when each public school day began with a brief devotional and prayer. This practice ended nationwide in 1962, when the U.S. Supreme Court removed school-sponsored prayer, declaring it unconstitutional.

Over the years, many thoughtful Christians have advocated for the return of Bible reading and prayer in public schools. Some have said that this morning devotional time was the only time many children ever got to read the Bible and pray. Others have argued that if we had kept prayer in our schools, we would not have many of the social ills we now have. Truly, our society has become more secular in the years since the Supreme Court ruling. Generations of Americans have grown up with little or no foundation of faith.

Those who have lobbied for prayer in school have had the same concern we all have. As followers of Jesus, we want all children to grow up with a strong foundation in faith. However, by eliminating school sponsored prayer, the Supreme Court took an important step to protect our rights as Christians. In order to protect the freedom we have to practice *our* faith, we have to protect the freedom of every person to practice *their* faith.

Schools are no longer permitted to lead morning devotions, but as Christians we can still let the light of Christ shine in public schools. Students can pray anytime and anywhere in school. They can wear clothing with religious messages, and share their faith with their friends. They can meet for Bible study before and after school, too. Teachers can be a caring, listening presence, reflecting the love of Christ to students, fellow teachers, and staff.

Much has changed in our world since the days when there was prayer and Bible reading in our schools, but there is one thing that has not changed. Children today, like children back then, need a personal and genuine relationship with Jesus Christ. Where will they find this relationships? They will find it first and foremost in their homes. Parents, grandparents, are you teaching your children to pray? Are you introducing them to the Scriptures? Are you living before them a life that introduces them to our Savior?

The church has a vital role to play, too. Our Sunday school classes and worship services, and our youth and children's ministries, are vitally important. We need adults who are willing to serve as teachers and leaders. And, more children from our community need to be invited to church. If our children are to learn to pray, if they are to learn the great stories of our faith, if they are to learn to know Jesus, it will be because we are committed to love them into the kingdom

of God!

Sermon Series

"Training for Christian Living"

A Series of Messages on "The Letter of James"

August 30 to September 27

As another school year approaches, the athletic fields and parking lots of our schools are abuzz with activity. Football and field hockey, soccer and cross country, and girls tennis, all are in training for fall sports. Marching bands, drill teams, and cheerleaders are rehearsing, too. From early morning until late evening, students run drills, learn plays, develop skills, build strength and speed, and practice, practice, practice. The training is intensive. The coaches and instructors demanding. Everyone is focused on the goal of performing at their very best, knowing they will represent their school in the upcoming season.

Beginning August 30, at our Sunday morning services, Pastor Denny and Pastor Dave will kick-off this school year with a five-week series of sermons on the New Testament Letter of James. Like a coach preparing his team for competition, James, the brother of Jesus, instructs us, "But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves." (James 1:22). Stewardship

Our Stewardship program is now in its 6th month in September. I hope you are enjoying the Stewardship Seconds each week, as presented by various church leaders/members. Take the time to look at the budget tree and notice all the flowers (budget areas) where our offerings are put to use. As the weeks go by, the tree becomes much more colorful, and begins to show the life of our varied ministries. Each week, the Stewardship Seconds provide an opportunity to hear about some aspect of the life and ministry of First Church using the resources that we provide in our regular offerings to the unified budget. As you will continue to hear each Sunday, FUMC has great plans (and needs) for our offerings, above and beyond your "regular" giving levels. Our total year



estimated unified budget shortfall for 2015 continues to be about \$50-60,000 (about 5-6%). If we can make-up this deficit during 2015, we can continue to provide (or expand) these important church ministries and missions. If we <u>cannot</u> make up this deficit, we may be forced to eliminate or reduce some of these important programs, ministries, missions, and/or staffing that we have heard about each week in the Stewardship Seconds.

Have you ever had to sacrifice and/or give up something that you really treasured? Some of us "give up something" for Lent to represent in a small way the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus made on the cross for us. I remember the day that I had to give up playing competitive basketball and softball. Ever since I was young, I was athletic and when I played sports, I played hard and to the maximum of my ability. Then one day I realized that my back and an older body just couldn't do it anymore. I had responsibilities that I could no longer risk, to keep playing competitive sports. So I hung up my glove and my sneakers. That was a BIG sacrifice for me, and it hurt. That's when I learned that something is not really a sacrifice unless you feel it.

In the 8th Chapter of 2nd Corinthians, Paul discusses the rich generosity of the Macedonian churches. Even in the midst of very severe trials and extreme poverty, the people gave <u>sacrificially</u>. In verse 3 he states "For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability – entirely on their own...." And then in the 21st chapter of Luke's gospel, is the story of the Widow's offering. "As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins. Truly I tell you...this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put all she had to live on." Both the Macedonian churches and the poor widow gave sacrificially, and I'm sure they felt it. SACRIFICE FILLS OUR LIVES WITH FAITH – AND MOVES THE HEART OF GOD.

During September's "Stewardship Seconds", our emphasis will be on the Children's Department budget. Our children are involved in many wonderful ministries. From Wonderful Wednesday and the Passion Play to Vacation Bible school and our Sunday School program. The Little Friends Nursery School is also a wonderful ministry and Christian based educational program that the church supports. During the church services in September, you will hear about these and many other Children's department activities. During September, be sure to listen and watch as we water and nourish the "Children's Department Root". If we have roots "Grounded in Faith", we will be able to "Grow to Serve".

FUM Scrip

What is it?

The FUM *Scrip* program is a church-wide fundraising program. Scrip is simply a word that means "substitute money" – in other words, scrip is gift certificates from national and local retailers. They're the same gift certificates that you buy at the store. So why not get them from us? Originally initiated by the handbell choirs, proceeds have also been used for the Women's Retreat and have been given to the church general fund. It could be helping with many things, but it seems most of our church members don't know about it! Do you?

How does it work?

The *Scrip* program gives you gift cards at face value. How do these stores help us raise money? It's simple –participating retailers agree to sell gift certificates to our organization at a discount. Families like yours <u>buy the certificates for full face value and redeem them for full face value</u>, and our church keeps the difference as revenue. On our scrip order sheet the percentage that the retailers give to us is noted. You will notice some retailers give us a much bigger percentage than others! Scrip is exciting, because everybody wins:

The retailer gets cash up front and repeat business....

We get a powerful fundraising alternative that involves no selling!

Our church gets a regular source of revenue.

Why use Scrip?

Why not?! We all grocery shop, buy gas, shop for clothes and go out to eat. Why not have a gift card to those favorite places of yours on hand? Use the card instead of money and get a new card in the next ordering cycle!

How to Order Scrip

Just fill in the Order Sheet and put it and your check or money in the envelope provided and insert it in the Scrip mailbox! Our mailbox is on the wall right around the corner from the main church hallway, to the left before you go down the stairs. You will have your cards on the delivery date posted. If you know you won't be in church that day, just make a note – we'll find you!

Are other Scrip cards not on the list available?

Maybe! We've tried to list our local retailers, but there are <u>many</u> more retailers available! We often put in orders for Walgreens, CVS, Acme and Crate and Barrel. If you put something in the "other" spot on the order sheet, we'll let you know if it's available or not. Or, just check with Kathie Bittenbender (697-6257 or email RBittenben@verizon.net) ahead of time!

Let's make the FUM *Scrip* program really do some fundraising for First Church! We've enclosed an order sheet in this newsletter to get you started. Give it a try! Order dates for September are the 6th and 20th, with delivery of Scrip cards the week after.



StrongWomen/Growing Stronger Strength Training Program Offered!

First United Methodist Church in Mechanicsburg and Penn State Extension will be teaming up again to offer the **StrongWomen/Growing Stronger Program** this fall. This is a 12-week program geared for middle-aged to older women and men and is based upon years of research on how strength training and proper nutrition improve the health of women and men of all ages. The program was developed to help individuals increase their strength, bone density, balance and energy and help them look and feel better. Participants will meet two times a week for one hour sessions. There is a \$90 fee and participants may want to provide their own hand weights and ankle weights.

The evening classes will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays, September 14 – December 7, 7:00 – 8:00 p.m. at the church which is located at 135 W. Simpson Street in Mechanicsburg. Mandatory paperwork must be completed in order to participate in the program and individuals over age 70 must get a doctor's permission. Past participants must pre-register.

Facilities

As the calendar changes to September, First Church will once again become a beehive of activity. Little Friends Nursery School will be resuming classes at the church on weekday mornings, New Hope Ministries after school program will be back in operation, our church choirs will be holding their weekly rehearsals, 3G will resume for our youth on Sunday evenings, and various church committees/outside organizations will be meeting regularly after a summer hiatus. These activities place a wonderful strain on our facility as we sense the presence of God all around us. Hopefully our ongoing cleaning and maintenance efforts have us well prepared to meet this increased tempo.

I am pleased to report that the restoration work in the lower level of the church building is almost finished. New floor tiles were installed in the pump room and the storage room off of the kitchen where the large reach-in freezer is located. Wall repairs and installation of new cove molding in areas affected by last fall's sewage pump malfunction are complete, and fresh paint covers the walls. We changed out one set of kitchen cabinets and countertop while this work was going on in order to make room for a new "yet to be bought" reach-in refrigerator for the church kitchen, and the new cabinets were painted to match the other 70 that Judi Buddenbaum and Marcia Espenshade refreshed. Judi and Marcia also led an effort to reorganize the contents of all those cabinets and installed new shelf liner in the process.

Two of our youth chose initiatives here at First Church for their Eagle Scout projects. Matthew Canonizado led the efforts on a prayer garden he envisioned for the east side of the church near King Alley. Matthew's design included replacement of the Brian James memorial weeping cherry tree that we removed earlier this spring, as well as a cross, benches, and other plantings. The project should wrap up shortly, hopefully by the time you read this. Nick LaPointe led a project to redo the Youth Lounge, including painting, furniture realignment, and construction of a portable wall to hide the building's main water pipes and sprinkler system controls. Nick's project was completed in early August. We are proud to support these young men as they strive for Scouting's highest honor.

The areas above and below the balcony on the Frederick Street side of the Sunday School Auditorium have been closed off in recent weeks. Eric King has been hard at work this summer repairing these walls that were damaged by water infiltration over a period of time. Matt Miller assisted with some needed wall patching, and we are about ready to reinstall covers over the heating pipes so that painting can be accomplished and these areas can be reopened for use. Thank you for your patience during this process.

Floor maintenance has been another priority in recent weeks. Whether it be stripping and waxing of tile floors or shampooing classroom carpets, summer provided an opportunity to focus on these efforts throughout the facility. There are still some areas to be completed, so bear with us if your normal pathway is temporarily blocked off while here at the church during the week.

We also recently survived what we thought was a sinkhole developing in the south parking lot. There was a hole about 18" wide and 3' deep. Mike Neidig inspected the hole and determined it to be decomposing fill under the surface, similar to the two other larger holes we dealt with in recent years. Mike filled the hole with crushed stone and we are taking a "wait and see" attitude before tackling the paving project we had planned to schedule. We do hope to move forward soon with a resealing and relining of the main church parking lot.
