From the Pastor

"Why To Wear Your Nametag to Church"

Just imagine. Betsy and I will soon celebrate our first anniversary here at First Church. You have so lovingly welcomed us into your life and ministry that already we feel like family here. Thank you!

Last summer, as we were getting to know you, most of you wore nametags to worship. Betsy and I really appreciated being able to look at your nametag and call you by name. Of course, as the weeks and months rolled by, most of us stopped wearing them. Then, I was inspired, first by a nudge from our wonderful Hospitality Committee, then by a great article by church consultant Thom Rainer .

Rainer, lists **ten reasons EVERYONE in church ought to wear a nametag:**

Few people know everybody in the church. Nametags allow us to call each other by name even if we are just meeting for the first time.

Leaders need help with names. I want to know everybody's name in my church, but I'm not gifted with that kind of memory. I admit I need help if I want to be the best church leader I can be. I would much prefer calling people by name as I minister to them – and nametags allow me to do so.

Nametags invite conversation. Knowing another person's name breaks down one barrier to conversations that church folks ought to feel comfortable having. It's simply easier to talk with others when you are on a first-name basis.

Knowing names makes fellowship more personal. While calling each other "brother" or "sister" sounds good (and is theologically on target), that nomenclature is often a cover up for "I'm sorry I don't know your name, and I'm embarrassed to ask." As long as conversations remain at the anonymous "brother" and "sister" level, fellowship will remain surface level.

Nametags save embarrassment. We've probably all called someone by the wrong name, only to realize it later (or perhaps even within the same conversation). If "brother" or "sister" is a gentle way of saying, "I don't know your name," using the wrong name is an undeniable way of doing so. That's embarrassing for both parties.

Nametags promote outward focus. Using nametags is one way to say, "We expect God to send us guests, and we want to be ready to welcome them when they come."

Guests feel less conspicuous. We might give guests a nametag, but we

should do so only if we are all wearing them, too. Guests should never be the ones who must ask members their names.

Saying to someone, “Please let us know your name” also says, “We want to know you.” Much has been written about guests’ desire for anonymity in churches, but I take a different slant on that issue. People who come to a church are looking for something. They often welcome care and concern. What they don’t want is to be smothered and made uncomfortable. That’s a different issue, though, than simply wanting to know them by name.


A “nametag” ministry provides opportunities for service. Somebody must purchase the name-tags. Somebody must distribute them. Greeters must remind folks to get their nametags. The opportunities for members to get involved in a simple but significant ministry are numerous.

Asking people to wear nametags costs little, but can reap big benefits. We're simply asking people in the church to wear a nametag to promote fellowship and welcome guests. In return we all get to know one another by name and newcomers feel welcomed and cared for. A win, win!

So, when you see me Sunday morning, I'll be wearing my nametag. Each week, I'm going to encourage you to do the same. Let's all be intentional about getting to know one another by name, for as we do we are being woven together in love.

Why should I give blood?

The most important reason for becoming a regular blood donor is to meet the blood needs of our community. There is no substitute for human blood; donors are the only source. Every two seconds, someone needs blood, and an adequate blood supply is crucial to their survival. Remember, just one pint of your blood can save as many as four lives.

The demand for blood continues to increase, yet only 5% of the population donates.

Scholarships

Visioning the future

Many years ago, two First Church families recognized the importance of education in today's society and bequeathed money to be used in supporting the post-secondary educational efforts of First Church members. The Comfort Education Fund was established to provide financial support to students preparing for the Christian ministry, and was slightly modified over time to be limited to declared candidates for ministry in the United Methodist Church. Being a declared candidate is a critical step because it recognizes the individual's formal application and acceptance into the ministerial development process. Right now our Youth Pastor Lisa Aronson is on that path, and First Church is supporting Lisa's efforts with some timely financial support from the Comfort Education Fund. The Betty Brandt Scholarship Fund was established to provide financial assistance to needy and worthy First Church students who are enrolled in programs in the field of health care and human services. The description was later modified by the family to provide financial assistance to handicapped students from First Church in need of financial aid. We thank the Comfort and Brandt families for their vision of the future educational needs of First Church members, and trust that we will continue to honor their memory when we award scholarships from the Funds bearing their names.

In addition, First Church member Earnie Zimmerman chose for a number of years to invest the salary that was due him in his position of Youth Director in creating a scholarship fund supporting the post-secondary educational pursuits of active members of First Church's youth department. We have invested those funds wisely over the years, and are now able to award up to \$2,000 of scholarships per year from the Youth Scholarship Fund. Many of First Church's youth have benefitted over the years from Earnie's generosity and foresight in helping to meet the ever-rising cost of a college education. For the upcoming 2016-2017 academic year, First Church is awarding eight \$250 scholarships from the Youth Scholarship Fund. We would like to thank Earnie Zimmerman for his vision of the value of education and for helping to make that vision a reality for so many of our youth.

Maybe you are a former recipient, or a parent or grandparent of a former recipient, and would like to "give back" to help sustain the vision of the Comfort/Brandt families and Earnie Zimmerman in supporting the educational pursuits of First Church's next generations.

Contributions are always accepted for these three scholarship funds that the Board of Trustees oversee on behalf of the entire church. Thank you for your prayerful consideration.

Facilities

Oh happy day! As of the time I am preparing this update, I am thrilled to report that all of our recent roof leaks have been fixed and we are “high and dry”. That includes the shingled roof above the Simpson Street entrance and the rubber roof above the center stairwell. Our repairs have been put to the test by some severe rainstorms over the past few weeks, and they appear to be holding just fine. Not having to get up on the roof and deal with those water leaks, even if it is just temporary, has taken a huge load of stress off my shoulders.

Once we felt good about the status of the roof, we set about in plastering and painting the sanctuary ceiling that was damaged near the Simpson Street entrance. Scaffolding was erected in the sanctuary to make those repairs, and a few pews were not available for seating on Sunday, June 5th. We were then able to tear the scaffolding down and restore order before worship services on June 12th. We also utilized the scaffolding to go up and change the two spotlights at the front of the choir loft, one of which had been burned out for a number of months. The new LED bulbs we installed have an estimated life of 25,000 hours so it should be quite a while until they will need changing again. The new bulbs are also smaller in diameter than the old bulbs, so we believe they could be changed out from the ground using a long, long pole with a bulb changing attachment. While we have the scaffolding on site, we plan to erect it for a scraping and painting project in the top right corner of the arch around the large stained glass window on the Frederick Street side of the church. We also plan to erect a portion of the scaffolding in the parking lot to address what appears to be a problem with the sensor on one of the dusk to dawn pole lights. By the time you read this, hopefully both of those projects will be completed.

Of course, not all Facilities news can be good news. We had some major issues with our air conditioning systems when the outside temperatures quickly rose from the middle 50’s to the low 90’s. On the last Sunday of May, the only one of the eight rooftop units that was operating was the one for the multipurpose room. It was quite uncomfortable in the sanctuary, education wing, and office wing that morning, which meant more time up on the roof for me. Communication issues between the master control panel, the circuit boards at the rooftop units, and the room temperature sensors caused those problems. All of the units are currently working, but we still aren’t able to make timely adjustments to the control system to match up with our church calendar, negatively impacting our energy efficiency. Our HVAC contractor is preparing a proposal for us to replace our existing, outdated control system with a proven modern alternative. We will be looking closely at that proposal in order to make a smart decision about a much-needed upgrade to our facility.

More good news! Judi and Larry Buddenbaum were able recently to complete the restriping project in our parking lots. We had the sewage lift station pumped out and cleaned. Doug Cale is making progress on replacing the rooftop exhaust fan servicing the education wing restrooms. The Trustees decided to replace the freestanding icemaker in the church kitchen, hopefully before VBS is held the last week of June. So a few more items will soon be crossed off my ever-expanding “to do” list. Thank you for your prayers and kind words of support for our efforts to be faithful stewards of the First Church facility.

Responding to God’s Call

Five years ago, I felt God urging me to apply for the position of Facilities Manager at First Church. I thought to myself, why me? What was God thinking? While I had been a homeowner for 30 years, and a member of the Board of Trustees both here and at our former church, my expertise from my

career in Navy financial management was in Excel spreadsheets and Word documents, not in electrical, plumbing, HVAC, roofing or any of the other trades. In addition, I have a long-standing fear of heights that I knew I would have to overcome (or learn to deal with) if I took on the Facility Manager position. I certainly wasn't equipped to take on this awesome responsibility.

I remembered an old saying that God doesn't call the equipped, He equips the called. I thought about some of the "big names" from the Bible, like Abraham, Moses, David, Peter and Paul. These persons did amazing things for the Lord, but they all had their failures as well. Despite those failures, God managed to use each of them in incredible ways! God and Jesus Christ, the Son of God, worked through them and gave them the power to accomplish much more than they ever could do by themselves. So I chose to apply for the position and allow God to work through me if that is what He truly wanted.

These past five years have been an incredible journey for me. Roof leaks, heating and air conditioning system failures, stair tread replacements, iron railings restoration, education wing restroom renovations, rerouting a rain leader from roof that had separated inside a masonry wall, faux sinkholes in the south parking lot, sewage lift station malfunction, more roof leaks, plastering and painting projects, sale of rental properties at 118/120 W. Keller and purchase of new church parsonage, installation of ADA operators at tower entrance and handicap-accessible restroom, tower hallway video system, digital carillon, bell tower roof replacement, Frederick Street gutters and downspouts, concrete sidewalks, computer network wiring expansion, and even more roof leaks have certainly kept me on my toes as I have strived with the Trustees to be faithful stewards of God's home here in Mechanicsburg.

One of my favorite Bible verses is Philippians 4:13 –I can do all things through God who strengthens me. I certainly haven't accomplished all of the things that needed to be done around the First Church facility in the past five years. But I can truly say that what I was able to accomplish was done with Christ working in and through me. Never say to yourself that God cannot use you because you aren't qualified. God isn't looking for the qualified; He's looking for persons who will avail themselves to Him and allow Him to work through those persons to further His kingdom here on earth. Thank you, God, for allowing me to respond to your call.
