From the Pastor

"Consecrated, Lord, to Thee"

At its August meeting, the Administrative Board of First Church approved the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our congregation this fall. I am excited about this program because its focus is not merely on the need of the church to receive, but on our need as disciples of Jesus to give as an important part of our spiritual growth.

On Consecration Sunday, November 15, we will ask our attendees and members to make financial commitments to support the church's mission and ministry. In addition, we will have a Ministry and Mission Fair to celebrate the many ways God is at work in and through our life together. You will hear more about this in the weeks to come. I want to thank you in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events!

As we plan for this program, I have been thinking about the word "*consecration*." It is not commonly used in our everyday language, but it is still filled with meaning for us as followers of Jesus. To consecrate means, "to make or declare something sacred," or "to dedicate somebody or something to God."

Long ago, our mothers and fathers in the faith *consecrated* our church building as a sacred space. They declared that the sanctuary was to be set apart to glorify God in worship. The classrooms and fellowship hall, the offices and multi-purpose room, even the parking lots were dedicated as sacred spaces where each generation could grow in faith and fellowship and service for Christ.

On World Communion Sunday, October 4, as we gather at the Lord's Table, Pastor Dave and I will say a prayer to *consecrate* the elements. We will remember that Jesus took the bread and the cup and made them sacred. *This* bread and *this* cup do not just nourish our bodies and quench our thirsts. The gift of God's grace, freely given to all in Jesus Christ, cannot be fully described in words. But as we partake of the *consecrated* elements, we experience the love of Christ, whose body was broken and blood was shed for our salvation.

The apostle Paul reminds us that, as followers of Jesus, we, too, have been *consecrated*. "*Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God-what is good and acceptable and perfect.*" (Romans 12:2). We are set apart in this world. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, our lives are formed to resemble the life of Jesus.

A great hymn of our faith expresses the same message, "Take my life and let it be, *consecrated*, Lord, to thee." The hymn continues, "Take my moments and

my days...take my hands...take my feet...take my voice...take my lips...take my silver and my gold...take my intellect...take my will...take my heart...take my love...take myself..." To ask God to **consecrate** our lives is to dedicate all that we are and all that we have in ways that honor God.

So, on **Consecration Sunday**, we will be asked, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to **consecrate**?" As our prayerful response, we will set apart an amount for the weekly offering and dedicate it to God's purposes. We trust that God will **consecrate** what we give and, in God's faithful hands, use it to produce abundantly!

Miller Estate Gift Designated to Endowment Fund

In July, First Church was the recipient of an estate gift from the late Janet Miller, a long-time congregation member.

The gift was designated to the Endowment Fund by the Administrative Board to support First Church's missions and ministries for generations to come.

Janet was born and raised in First Church, and a dedicated member. "We had good times together," said First Church member Lois Coover. Lois's late husband, Bill, was Janet's brother.

Rev. Don Ciampa, Pastor Emeritus, described Janet as a very cultured and intelligent woman. "We had wonderful conversations. She was a friend."

"She loved beauty, and the art of music," Pastor Ciampa said. "She loved things that were pleasing to the ear and eye."

As an adult, Janet left First Church to join a congregation in Colonial Park, then returned to this area and First Church almost a decade ago.

Janet was a graduate of Mechanicsburg Area High School, and Lebanon Valley College. She worked as an elementary school teacher and reading consultant with Central Dauphin School District until her retirement.

GROUNDING IN FAITH -- GROWING TO SERVE

Our Stewardship program is now entering its 7th month in October. I hope you are enjoying the Stewardship Seconds each week, as presented by various church leaders/members. Take the time to look at the budget tree and notice all the flowers (budget areas) where our offerings are put to use. As the weeks go by, the tree becomes much more colorful, and begins to show the life of our varied ministries. Each week, the Stewardship Seconds provide an opportunity to hear about some aspect of the life and ministry of First Church using the resources that we provide in our regular offerings to the unified budget. As you will continue to hear each Sunday, FUMC has great plans (and needs) for our offerings, above and beyond your “regular” giving levels. Over the last couple of months, we have started to “pick away” at our budget deficit. The congregation’s response has been both positive and reassuring. Our total year estimated unified budget shortfall for 2015 has now been reduced to about \$30-35,000. If we can make-up this deficit during 2015, we can continue to provide (or expand) these important church ministries and missions. If we cannot make up this deficit, we may be forced to eliminate or reduce some of these important programs, ministries, missions, and/or staffing that we have heard about each week in the Stewardship Seconds.



In the last few months’ articles, we discussed 3 important aspects of giving. In order to be *rich with God*, we need to:

- Give to God Cheerfully**
- Give to God Regularly**
- Give to God Sacrificially**

As you consider making an additional contribution to our unified budget to support these important ministries and programs, just remember these statements.

God doesn’t need our money - he just wants our heart.

Regular giving strengthens your generosity muscle.

It’s not a sacrifice unless you feel it.

And, sacrifice fills our lives with faith – and moves the heart of God.

During October’s “Stewardship Seconds”, our emphasis will be on the Adult Ministries’ budget. You will hear more about how, thanks to your generous giving, this ministry is able to reach out, invite and provide a welcoming environment to the seekers in our community. We are also able to offer opportunities for spiritual growth and discipleship to all, no matter where they are in their spiritual journey, through Bible studies and small groups. An additional focus during October's "Stewardship Seconds" will be on the Health & Wellness Committee. Through your annual giving, First Church's Health & Wellness committee is blessed to be able to provide many different programs (i.e. health lectures) which improve the physical, spiritual and emotional health of both our congregation and the community. During October, be sure to listen and watch as we water and nourish the “Adult Ministries Root”. If we have roots “**Grounded in Faith**”, we will be able to “**Grow to Serve**”.

Sierra Leone Partners Conference

In 2008 an idea was born to unite as many organizations working in Sierra Leone as possible into a day or two of making connections. There are individuals representing a variety of ministries, several annual conferences, organizations that handle shipping, provide equipment and much more. This year the conference was held on August 20 & 21 in Plainfield, IN. Also in attendance were Bishop John Yambasu from the Sierra Leone Annual Conference and several other Sierra Leone delegates representing the 3 main areas of focus for the conference—Medical, Education and Agriculture.

Of particular interest to the Sierra Leone Initiative partner churches, of which First Church is one, is Bishop Yambasu's vision for moving toward self-sustainability through agriculture. The Sierra Leone Conference has established the Community Empowerment for Livelihood and Development Project for the purpose of joining Conference, local church and community leaders in partnership and as the drivers of the program. Together these leaders agree on what the community really needs. The Conference will provide training to local community members as well as money to get started, some of which will come from partner churches. The Sierra Leone Conference hopes to employ a professional agriculturalist to aid with education and training of local communities. Committees consisting of members of the local community will report back to the Conference.

Several members of First Church plan to journey to Sierra Leone in 2016 and we are hoping to participate in a community meeting in Taiama, where our sister church is located and return to share with you how we can help Taiama move toward self-sustainability.

Scholarships

Eleven members of First Church were recently awarded scholarships totaling \$2,500 for the 2015-2016 academic year by the Board of Trustees. Notes for Communion Stewards

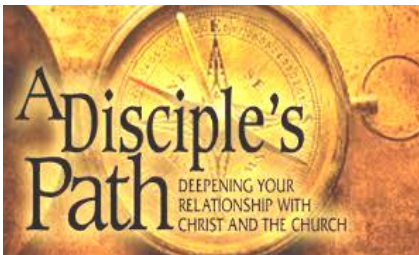
- * The pastor will invite you to come forward when it is time to prepare for Communion.
- * We will offer 4 communion stations spread across the front of the sanctuary –
 1. green chairs
 2. near the steps
 3. front and center of altar
 4. over by choir loft
- * There should be hand-cleaner available for you to use by the altar– gives the congregation peace of mind, especially during cold and flu season.
- * When distributing the bread, you should be the one to break off pieces of bread to avoid having multiple hands reaching into the bread. (Ideally the parent or older youth member shares the bread and the younger helper shares the cup.)
- * Upon receiving folks at your station, speaking their name in sharing communion is a wonderful thing if you know them by name ☺
 - For those with the bread: "The body of Christ, broken for you."
 - For those with the cup: "The blood of Christ, shed for you."
- * When your station has served everyone coming forward, then you may return to the altar, share communion with one another, and return the elements to the altar.
- * Thank you ever so much in serving your brothers and sisters in Christ!

Children's Department

Did you know that the largest fund-raising events for Church World Service are CROP Hunger Walks (Christian Rural Overseas Program). The first CROP Hunger Walk was in the 1960s. Now more than 2,000 communities across the U.S. join in CROP Hunger Walks each year. A unique aspect of CROP Hunger Walks is that Church World Service doesn't receive all of the money raised. Up to 25% of the money donated is given to local hunger fighting agencies which include food banks and community gardens. Additionally, those sponsoring a walker can specify whether Church World Service or an alternative global hunger-fighting agency will receive the remaining 75% of the donation.

The CROP Walk this year is on October 18. The proceeds go towards providing food, water, and shelter to those in need in this country and around the world.

The BLT's (Believing, Loving Tweens) are walking as a group along with several others from our church who have volunteered to walk. You can sponsor them by making a donation. There is a donation sheet at the CROP Walk display on the Missions Table located in the Narthex. And each CROP Walk Participant has their own Donation Envelope. Donations can be cash or check made payable to CROP Walk. There will also be a basket located at the Missions Table for CROP Walk Donations each Sunday up to and including October 18!!!!

Library

As I sit at the computer this morning, I wonder what I can write that would make you come into the library and check out a book. I have told you how I love to read when it is cold, and I have my steaming cup of joe at my side. I have told you how summer prompts me to bring my book pool side with an icy glass of tea. Have I inspired you to follow my example? I have told you that we have dedicated volunteers to help you find the perfect read. And best yet, I have told you that thanks to your support, the library has the newest Christian bestsellers the moment they are out. So what more is there to say—except stop in and let us show you. Meanwhile, let me just mention what has recently arrived.

I am sure you know that I love a good mystery, and in the library October is “mystery month”. I rarely read Amish fiction (but I sure know that many of you do!) so I may have to give Vanetta Chapman a try. She has written three books called the *Amish Village Mysteries*. **Murder Simply Brewed**, **Murder Tightly Knit**, and **Murder Freshly Baked** are all set in the Amish Artisan Village of Middlebury, Indiana. Amber Wright, an Englisher, and Hannah Troyer, a young Amish woman, team up to solve these murders in their town before anyone else can get hurt. Reviewers applaud Ms. Chapman for her vivid descriptions of the town and the colorful characters. They also mention a bit of romance has been thrown into these light mysteries. I personally think books centered on caffeine, crafts, and pie can’t go far wrong. Give them a try and see if you agree with me!

I have noticed a recent reality TV show is specializing in cold cases. Where one media succeeds, books will follow. Janice Cantore’s *Cold Case Justice Series* has started off with **Drawing Fire**. Abbey Hart and PI Luke Murphy have joined forces to find a serial killer preying on the elderly in Long Beach, California. While working the case together, they find they also have a mutual interest in the fire that killed Abbey’s parents years ago, a case that has never been solved. Totally centered on the case, the two can’t deny they are attracted to each other. I won’t spoil the plot or the ending. I will let you find the clues that solve the mysteries in this book.

The library will have a mini book sale on November 14th in conjunction with Little Friends Fall Festival. If you missed donating your gently used books, CDs, DVDs, or puzzles to our summer sale, you have another opportunity. Facilities

There is one thing that I can state, unequivocally, about the First Church facility: it never ceases to challenge us to keep things running in peak operating condition. Whether it be roof leaks that require patching, weeds in the flower beds that need pulled, burnt out light bulbs that need replaced, depressions in the parking lot that need filled, rooms that need painted, or leaking plumbing fixtures that need attention, there is always something that needs done in or around the building and that doesn't count the improvements we are always looking to make.

I am excited to report that Bill Seig and Eric King installed a base cabinet, double bowl sink, and two single lever faucets in the women's restroom on the second floor of the Education wing. We now have two hot and cold water running sinks in each of the Education wing restrooms, which has already proven to be a huge hit with the teachers from Little Friends Nursery School when they take all of their students to the restrooms for hand washing. I am especially grateful for Bill Seig's assistance on these restroom renovations, especially since Bill was fighting his own medical battles during this process.

By the time you read this, we should have completed a relamping of the large hanging light fixtures in the church sanctuary. This is a multiperson effort, as it requires lowering those fixtures from above the sanctuary ceiling. Thank you to all who helped in this project, and I hope you can tell the difference when you are in the sanctuary for worship services.

Matthew Canonizado's Eagle Scout project of a prayer garden on the east side of the church near King Alley is still in process. Charlie Ryder has offered to assist Matthew in constructing the wooden cross that will be a focal point of the prayer garden. Thank you to Charlie for your willingness to help.

I wish I could report that our efforts for repairing the Frederick Street wall in and underneath the balcony were complete but, unfortunately, that is not the case yet. There are still some wall repairs to be made up in the balcony, and the heating pipe covers still need to be reinstalled. Every time I think I will have time to work on that project, something else comes up that demands my attention. I do hope to complete the repairs before the end of October. Thank you for your continued patience during this process.

Over at the church parsonage on Colony Road, we are readying to have a really large tree professionally cut down in front. The tree is right along the street, and continues to lose large branches in every storm which create a hazard for passing motorists. Removing the tree should also help the front lawn since it won't be competing with tree roots for sustaining water.

Last month I addressed a "faux sinkhole" that appeared in the south parking lot. We recently experienced a little more settling in that area, which Mike Neidig was quick to fill with crushed stone. Thank you Mike. We feel it is safe to drive in that section of the lot, but are keeping a close eye on it in case the hole reappears.

I can't emphasize enough how important it is to alert me if you see something broken or in need of our attention around the church. Your eyes really help us in our efforts to be faithful stewards of this wonderful facility. Thank you.
