2020 Vision

Have you had your vision tested lately? You know the test, where you sit in a dark room and the doctor instructs you to cover one eye and read the smallest print you can see on the eye chart. Near the bottom of the chart, where the letter are quite small, is the 20/20 line. Being able to read that line is the standard for "normal" vision. If you have extraordinary eyesight, you can read even smaller letters, but most of us need corrective lenses even to read the 20/20 line. I'm so thankful for those corrective lenses! I've worn glasses since the 9th Grade!

Have you had your vision tested lately? Vision can also mean how you look at life. One of my favorite novels is *Joshua* by Joseph F. Girzone. It depicts Jesus as a contemporary wood artist with the Hebrew name of Joshua. Joshua has moved to a small house on the edge of a fictional town called Auburn. He lives very simply, very openly, and with kindness and generosity toward everyone. Suspicious at first because he is a stranger with ways unlike their own, the townspeople eventually come to like and admire Joshua.

One day a Jewish factory owner, Aaron Fahn, admiring Joshua's life, asks him how he came to be that way. "I can't understand how anyone could develop the vision for life that you have," Aaron says. "It is so foreign to my way of thinking, and so different from the thinking of everybody I know."

"Each person," says Joshua, "looks at life through a different vision. Three men can look at a tree. One man will see so many board feet of valuable lumber worth so much money. The second man will see it as so much firewood to be burned, to keep his family warm in the winter. The third man will see it as a masterpiece of God's creative art, given to a man as an expression of God's love and enduring strength, with a value far beyond its worth in money or firewood. What we live for determines what we see in life and gives clear focus to our inner vision."

Aaron asks, "Who taught you to think this way?"

"It is what I see," say Joshua. "You could see it, too, if you could detach yourself from the things that you were taught to value. They do not give you peace, nor do they give you lasting satisfaction. They leave you empty, and filled with a longing for something more."

Aaron admits that is true, but wants to know how Joshua knows it.

"I know how God made us," says Joshua, "and understand what we really need if we are to grow and find peace" (New York: Macmillan Co., 1987, p. 67).

Reading *Joshua* not only prodded my thinking about Jesus if he lived in the modern world; it also helped me realize the radical difference between Jesus' vision for life and the things the world values.

We're beginning this new year with a series of messages on the vision of Jesus for living a life of joy and fulfillment entitled, "The Beatitudes: Keys to a Blessed Life." We will explore each of the eight keys Jesus gives us in Matthew 5:3-12, as we dig into what many have called the greatest sermon ever preached.

From the Library

I know you will be reading this in January, and if you are like me, January can be a time of calm and regrouping. But as I write this in early December, I feel like my body is trying to get me out of my chair and back to December business, and my soul is yearning for my sewing room. So if there are any run-on sentences or incoherent thoughts, you will understand. Begin by thinking about books as I really do have some great reads!

If you liked the December books with short stories and quick reads, I have just the book for you. **Amish Front Porch Stories: 18 Short Tales of Simple Faith and Wisdom** is written by the Brunstetter women, Wanda, her daughter-in-law Jean, and her granddaughter, Richelle. If you like the Amish genre, this book fills the bill and more. It's a book written by women for women about problems any woman might face—cranky neighbors, infertility, or simply a lack of patience. Each story handles journeys of faith, love and joy in Amish Country. It is easy to read in small chunks of time.

If Amish fiction isn't your genre, Lynette Eason has recently released **Protecting Tanner Hollow**, four novellas in her usual plot line of romantic suspense. Enjoy these nail-biting stories in one book, almost a late Christmas present. Each short book has the word lethal in its title, and in each story someone's life is in danger, and it is a race to save that person's life. Great books—easy to read in small chunks of time and

they won't keep you up late!

Finally there is news about the conclusion of *Marshall Family Series* by Susan May Warren. Many of you have enjoyed the stories of Tate, Knox, Ford, and Wyatt, but Ms. Warren is wrapping up the series with their sister, Ruby Jane. Set in Russia (and yes, you read that right), Ruby Jane is running from the police with Mack Jones a man she loved and lost when he was supposedly killed in a car crash. When she sees him on the news as a hero in a small town, she seeks him out. But he doesn't remember her or his earlier life. He has felt a sense of foreboding, but he has been living a quiet life in a small town. All that is over after his face appears on national news, and now they are on the run. Will he remember Ruby Jane or just fall in love all over again? This is the final book in this series and reviewers have said it is going out with a bang. If you have overlooked this series, you might want to get started on book one as they are best read in order.

If none of these books appeals to you, stop in the library and someone will introduce you to new authors or new books by your favorite author.

New Sanctuary Space

Access Ministry Team has helped to add a sensory space in the sanctuary. It can be found behind the green chairs section in the corner. This sensory space is intended for individuals affected with sensory needs and should not be viewed or used as toys or as a play area. We ask all church members to help convey this message and to help explain this space to our children.

Sensory tools can help to calm or to stimulate individuals with unique and specific sensory needs. For example, a rocking chair can provide a calming rhythm, or a small tent can provide a sense of safety. Providing this space means the entire family of a person with sensory needs can have an opportunity to be actively engaged in the life of the church. The Body of Christ is made stronger and more beautiful when everyone can participate.

In addition to the sensory space there are also noise cancelling headphones available at the sound booth and in the sensory space. Noise cancelling headphones can help individuals participate that otherwise feel overwhelmed by the sounds in the sanctuary. Have you ever seen small children cover their ears in church? Now multiple the sound and you can get just a small sense of what sensory overload might feel like.

We continue to try to meet the needs of all God's children. If you have a family member, friend or neighbor that chooses not to attend church because of the needs of their family member, share this news with them. This might just be an answer to prayers.

Acolyte Information

Did you know that acolytes have a very important job? The word acolyte comes from the Greek word *akolouthos*, meaning follower, a helper or assistant and they have been part of the church in one form or another for nearly 2,000 years. Did you ever wonder why the acolyte lights candles at the beginning of each service and carries it out at the end? "Jesus said: 'I am the light of the world'" (John 8:12). Light in the form of a flame is carried into the church sanctuary to symbolize the entrance of Christ's light into the place of worship. At the end of the service, the light is carried out into the world to show that Jesus Christ is for all people everywhere. Would you like to help carry on this important tradition of the church? Clearance Updates Required

As per state law and our churches Safe Sanctuary requirements, clearances for those 18 years of age and older who serve alongside children and youth MUST be updated every 5 years. Because a bulk of First Church partners in ministry (those serving in any capacity within the children and youth departments) updated their clearances at the same time, most are approaching their 5 year renewal with the start of 2020. Therefore, it is very likely your clearances need to be updated. This includes Child Abuse Clearance, PA Police Background Check, FBI fingerprinting or notarized affidavit, and your Safe Sanctuary training. To begin the process please verify with Dawn Fisher or Anna Harris as to when your 5 year renewal must be completed. On **January 12 and 19** after services and during the Sunday school hour there will be opportunities to get your affidavit notarized. Notaries will be available for those that qualify for a signed affidavit instead of FBI fingerprinting. (Affidavit are available for only those who are non-paid staff and who have lived consecutively in the state of Pennsylvania for at least 10 years. Out of state college is not an exception). We will provide the notary form, just come with a valid form of ID to the main lobby on either **January 12 or 19**. Watch your email for an invitation to participate in a Safe Sanctuary training. Training has moved to an online platform and links are issued per person (please do not share the link for the training). Complete the remaining clearances on-line by following the instructions located under the “Safe Sanctuary” tab of the Children’s Ministry page at fumchurch.com

Feminine Hygiene Kits

Just a reminder about the sewing day Deborah Circle is sponsoring to make feminine hygiene kits for Mission Central. If you have not heard about these kits, it is an eye opener to know what women and girls do in poor countries to take care of their menstrual period. Sometimes they use dirt or weeds or worse during this time and if nothing works, they must stay home from school or work one week a month. This adds to their poverty and lack of education. To get a fuller look at this project go to Mission Central and look under ways to contribute and there is a larger explanation, patterns, and directions. You can help with this project even if you don't sew. There is a lot of cutting out of materials and if you do sew simple sewing. A serger sewing machine is very helpful but not mandatory. We will start at 8:30 on January 12th (January 19th if we need a snow day) and sew until the fabric is used up, we are done, or you just need to leave. We will be setting up in Fellowship Hall. Pack a lunch if you care too. Coffee and muffins will be provided in the morning. UMW is providing the first \$100. worth of fabric including the all-important water proof fabric needed. If you can bring flannel or cottons for the project great. All fabrics must be washed in unscented soap and no fabric softener used. If the fabric is preshrunk and the kit made properly the kit will last 3 years. The fabric dos and don'ts are listed on the Mission Central website (and there are several). If you can bring your sewing machine-great. Other sewing supplies such as sharp scissors, rotor cutters, quilting rulers, and cutting mats will be needed. Dark thread is always used. In order to have enough fabric and patterns, please call or email me, Donna Nichols at djnichols43@hotmail.com. Tanya Weaver who presented this project Mission Central and actually went to Africa and distributed these kits said it was just like Christmas- the girls and women were so happy to have the kits. It was also mentioned that this kits maybe distributed poor areas in our country

Day of Pampering


