Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. (Romans15:7)

All my life I have been a church "insider." From the time I was carried into the church nursery as a small child through all of my adulthood, I have been no stranger in church. Whenever I was a new pastor somewhere, the congregation prepared for my arrival long before I got there. During the early months of my appointment as a district superintendent, when no one in a church knew who I was, I had the feel of being a "visitor." But usually, by the end of the service, someone said something, and the bubble burst!

Then, in the summer of 2014, during a renewal leave, Betsy and I intentionally attended churches where we were totally unknown. For three months of Sundays, in nearby churches of various traditions, and in United Methodist Churches far from home, we were total strangers. Of course, we are still "insiders." There was little that was unfamiliar to us in any of the services we attended. Still, being completely unknown made us more sensitive to what it must be like for those who enter a church for the first time.

In some places we visited, we experienced warm hospitality. People were at the doors to welcome us. All around us people smiled and introduced themselves. They didn't smother us, but even before we heard the music or the pastor's preaching, we felt at home. In other places, the people were certainly "friendly" to each other. There may have been greeters at the doors, but once inside we were on our own. In the hallways, people walked past us as if we were invisible. During the "passing of the peace" in worship, everyone seemed so anxious to catch up with their friends, ignoring us. The music might have been grand and the preaching inspiring, but we quietly came and left as strangers.

At First Church we are intentional about welcoming everyone. We have "Red Coats" at the entrances and in the hallways. We have a welcome center with a host and helpful information. We have signs and maps and greeters at the sanctuary doors. All of these things promote a positive, welcoming environment around our church.

However, showing hospitality to strangers is not just the job of a few who serve in particular roles on Sunday mornings. *All of us* are responsible to welcome others. Whether you are in the parking lot, the hallway, a classroom, or in the sanctuary, if you see someone who is new to you, smile, extend a hand, tell him or her your name, and listen for a response. Show the same hospitality to

Ringing In the News

The bell choirs have been busy preparing music for you to enjoy at worship and other venues. A group went to Lancaster to perform with 15 other bell choirs at a mini conference on March 12th. Another group is preparing for a mini conference in State College on April 2nd. Of course the Vancouver group continues to prepare their music for the International Symposium in July.

On **April 17**th at 7pm you can come to our own sanctuary to enjoy a concert by both of our bell choirs. The theme for the evening is "Having Fun with Handbells". Handbells are used for more than sacred music and at a church it is a rare occasion that other than sacred music is heard. Come and hear other things handbells can play as well as some fun sacred music. We also have a surprise guest choir coming – you won't want to miss them!

The bells are continuing their fundraising efforts with the annual **Spaghetti Dinner** being held in Fellowship Hall on Saturday, **April 30**th. Come and join us between 4 and 6:30pm for dinner. Steinway Piano 110th Birthday

Our Steinway piano turned 110 years old in February. According to Steinway company records our piano is a Model D concert grand in ebony finish. It was completed in the New York factory on February 15, 1906 and sold to Mrs. Joseph A. Stillman, 19 East 72nd Street, in New York City on December 20, 1906. This address still exists and is one block off Central Park in Manhattan. The piano was then sold to N. Stetson & Co., in Philadelphia, PA, on March 24, 1911. Somehow this 9 foot piano found its way to Mechanicsburg, owned by two maiden sisters. After their death it was put up for auction. A number of persons were interested in acquiring the piano. In talking with some long time members, someone from First Church won the bidding (some say for \$100, another thought it was \$125). In any event, the piano was then placed in the church. Bill Dietz provided the information about the two sisters and he recalls that his father (who was the organist at First Church) and Dave Coover's father were instrumental (no pun intended) in getting the piano to the church. Ed Stansfield recalls the piano being in the church during the 1930s. Model D is the largest grand piano Steinway manufactures and is considered the "Cadillac" of pianos.

A new Steinway model D today would cost approximately \$150,000. I found one similar to ours (model D, 120 years old) for sale for \$175,000. We need to maintain an ongoing respect for this valuable treasure. We are fortunate to own such a prized instrument allowing us to praise our Lord and God in fine style.

Facilities

What a difference a day makes! I submitted my Facilities Update for the March newsletter on February 15th and stated that, for the most part, winter hadn't caused us any major facilities problems around First Church. The day after I submitted that report, we had a snow/ice/rain storm in Mechanicsburg that resulted in three roof leaks (the persistent one near the hatch access to the roof as well as two new leaks in the sanctuary; one near the Frederick Street entrance and one near the Simpson Street entrance).

For the leak near the Frederick Street entrance, a short downspout carrying rainwater from the Frederick tower roof to the main church roof froze up and split open along its seam, resulting in water spraying onto and through the masonry joints in the tower brickwork and down the inside of that wall into the sanctuary. Our roofing contractor performed some masonry repointing, fashioned a new downspout, and sprayed waterproofing solution over those bricks to resolve that issue. His efforts appear to have been successful because we haven't seen any water infiltration in that area from subsequent storms.

For the leak near the Simpson Street entrance, the ice and temperature extremes led to a small crack in the solder covering a seam in the metal flashing on the east side of the Simpson tower (just large enough for water to find its way through and down the inside of the tower wall and into the sanctuary; it doesn't take much but water finds its way). Our roofing contractor resoldered along that seam and resolved that issue for us. Again, we haven't seen any recurrence of water infiltration in that area from subsequent rainfalls.

The leak near the hatch access to the roof has been much more difficult to resolve. Once we had a couple nice days weather-wise, our roofing contractor replaced about 200 square feet of rubber roofing and some of the rigid foam insulation panels underneath the rubber roof in that area. We were confident that we had finally solved this persistent leak and were ready to replace some ceiling panels at the top of the center stairwell that had been damaged by this leak over a period of time. I was emotionally crushed when I received a call on Sunday evening, March 13th, advising that water was dripping again onto the center stairwell and the hallway at the top of that stairwell from Sunday's rain, even more so than before our latest repair efforts. Our roofer and I are totally frustrated by this development, but are hoping to find the source of the leak before the situation worsens.

I am pleased to report that the wall and ceiling plaster repairs in the Frederick Street balcony are complete, and we are working to get a fresh coat of paint on all of the impacted areas so that the area can be opened up for regular foot traffic and access to the Comfort Corner. This has been a big restoration effort, so we are thankful that it should soon be in our rearview mirror.

Dealing with the roof leaks, plaster repairs and painting efforts has occupied most of my time (and thoughts) during the past month, so I haven't made much progress on the items on my "to do" list. The choir loft spotlights still need to be replaced. The requirements statement for replacing the control system for our rooftop HVAC units still needs to be finalized. The recent theft of the subwoofer for the electronic drumkit emphasizes the need to replace our video security surveillance system. I've received one proposal for video upgrades in the sanctuary and Sunday School auditorium and am looking to get one or two more proposals before we move out on those upgrades. Each day brings new challenges to maintaining and improving our First Church facility. Thank you for your ongoing prayers and words of encouragement for our efforts to be faithful stewards of God's house in Mechanicsburg.
