"A Prayer for Peace"

Every spring, at the end of another season in the children's choir of Grace Church, Carlisle, members of the choir would receive an award for participating. The first year we received a wooden cross with a black chord to wear with our choir robes the following season. Year two, we were given a red chord to add to the cross, followed by a silver cross at the end of the third year. I still have those crosses and treasure the memory of Mrs. Kauffman who presented them to me. She was our pastor's wife and choir director, Mrs. Kauffman, and her joyful enthusiasm and love for children instilled in me a love for the music of the church. If you see me rocking as we sing in church it's due, in large part, to her influence.

Today, as I write this, I am thinking of the gift we received after four years in the children's choir. It has hung on a wall wherever I've lived or worked ever since: a framed print of "A Prayer for Peace" by St. Francis of Assisi. At the time I received this gift, I had never heard of Francis or the prayer. I didn't know that, as a young man, Francis had turned away from his wealthy inheritance to serve the poor and witness for peace in a very tumultuous time in France.

I think of his prayer today in view of recent events. The deaths of young black males in encounters with white law enforcement officers, the loss of life within the Hispanic/Latino community and among brothers and sisters identifying with the LGBTQ community in Orlando, the death of police officers protecting the citizens of their communities, senseless acts of terrorism in Belgium and France, and local news reports all point to the destructive cycle of violence in our world. Francis' prayer is a call for followers of Jesus to end this cycle by turning the world's ways upside down. It boldly asks God to transform us so that we would not be given to despair, but to sow hope, light, and joy.

New Rules Offer Advantage for Charitable Giving Through Retirement Accounts

If you are at least age 70 ½, have a tax deferred retirement account and are required to make minimum distributions from it, you may be able to enjoy substantial tax benefits.

New legislation allows for Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD), through which you designate the distributions or a portion of them to a qualified non-profit or charitable organization such as First Church. This method provides for a direct transfer to the church without being counted as income to you. This action will likely result in tax savings as well as provide a convenient way to support your church.

Support can be designated to the General or Endowment Funds.

If you currently have a financial or tax advisor or work with a stock broker, be sure to ask about QCD and whether it would be an advantage for you. If you don't currently work with a professional, please contact the church office for assistance.

We know you have a commitment to support First Church. This may be another way to accomplish that.

Why should I give blood?

The most important reason for becoming a regular blood donor is to meet the blood needs of our community. There is no substitute for human blood; donors are the only source. Every two seconds, someone needs blood, and an adequate blood supply is crucial to their survival. Remember, just one pint of your blood can save as many as four lives.

The demand for blood continues to increase, yet only 5% of the population donates.

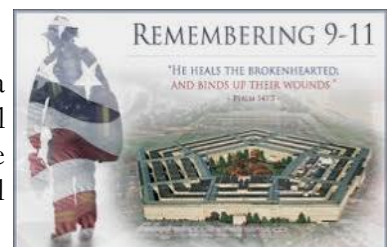

As I sit at the computer on this blistering hot July day, I am torn between ordering fantastic Christmas books for your reading pleasure or writing about great books you can read by the pool in August. Thinking of Christmas almost sent me into a tailspin, so I decided you should hear about the great books that are on the shelf now.

This summer has been so hectic for me that I really enjoyed the **Sins of the Past: A Romantic Suspense Novella Collection** by some of my favorite romantic suspense writers: Dee Henderson, Lynette Eason, and Dani Pettrey. Each of the three mysteries is long enough to let the plot develop, but not so long it made me ignore my family. (Sorry to say that has happened during very intense books.) Ms. Henderson starts the trilogy about a sheriff whose mother is missing from her retirement home in *Missing*. As the hours pass local authorities work with him to find her before it's too late. In *Shadowed* Dani Pettrey writes about a professional swimmer and a competition swim in the frigid waters of Alaska. When Libby Jennings takes an afternoon off training to go on a whale watching tour with professional fisherman Ben McKenna, the last thing she expects to see in the water is the body of her main competitor. Lynette Eason really keeps you on the edge of your seat in *Blackout*. Macy Adams is terrified by a past event that she cannot totally remember. And someone wants to make sure she never remembers. Two people have died either trying to help her or demanding she remember the armed robbery she witnessed six years ago. When her neighbor Chad Latham, a homicide detective, wants to help and also get to know Macy, she is sure harm will come to him and warns him off. But Chad doesn't take no for an answer and the suspense builds as the two of them edge closer and closer to the truth.

On the little lighter side, Becky Wade has written a fourth book in the **Porter Family series**. Though each book has some mystery, I would class these books as more in the romance genre. NFL superstar Grayer Fowler has a stalker and has begun receiving death threats. His team has hired Dru Porter, a bodyguard who is half his size and beautiful to boot. Dru is a former Marine, expert marksman, and a black belt, but she is rebounding off a disaster on her last job. Determined to earn back her pride and protect her client, Dru throws herself into protecting Gray and finding his stalker. In order to be successful she and Gray must trust each other completely. They also must fight their growing attraction and focus on the danger closing in on them. Don't miss this page turner as well as the first three books in the series.

Access Ministry

AC-CESS /'ak,sɛs/ a means of approaching or entering; a way in.

As sinners, our “*means of approaching,*” our “*way in*” or our **ACCESS** to God, the Father, is through Jesus Christ alone. John 14:6 tells us, “*Jesus answered, I am the way, the truth, and the life. The only way to the Father is through me.*” Praise God for meeting our eternal need through the gift of Jesus, our Savior.

The need for a Savior is all-inclusive; we're all in need, regardless of gender, ethnicity, socioeconomic position, age or *ability*. And being part of a faith community is vital to our spiritual growth as we accept and learn to follow Jesus. The author of *A Disciple's Path: Deepening Your Relationship with Christ and the Church* states, “...we cannot be growing [as] disciples of Jesus Christ without the encouragement, guidance, wisdom, and accountability of other disciples.” Even so, people with disAbilities often find it difficult to attain full inclusion in the church. There are structural, attitudinal, informational, and procedural barriers which stand between people with disAbilities and their need to gain **ACCESS** to being fully engaged in ministry.

Did you know that....

...people with disAbilities are necessary and valuable members of the Body of Christ.

...we are called to go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation: people with disAbilities are part of the whole creation.

...the latest United States census says about 20% of Americans have a disAbility.

...people with disAbilities are among the world's most marginalized and excluded people.

...families affected by disAbility often feel isolated.

Let's make church the place where people of *all* abilities belong, where we are *all* encouraged, and where we can *all* find hope and love. Let's join together to provide a “*way in,*” so that, if others have never accepted Christ, they would have the opportunity to do so and, therefore, have **ACCESS** to God, the Father. And, if they have already been following Jesus, providing a “*way in*” would, of course, allow **ACCESS** to many opportunities to deepening their relationship with the Savior and the church.

The **ACCESS MINISTRY** team has begun meeting again for the purpose of planning for a journey toward becoming fully engaged to and with the disAbility community. You are a very important part of the journey. **Join us now as we take the first step.** It's not difficult. Everyone can do it. And, it will have an extraordinary impact because God hears the prayers of His people.

Step 1: Asking ~ Asking God.

In this step, we pray....and pray.....and pray some more. We ask God.....

~to prepare the hearts of leadership, the congregation, and families in the community who are living with disAbility

~to send workers into this specific field of ministry
