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"How Will You Get to Bethlehem"

It was 1865. The Civil War had just ended. President Lincoln had been assassinated. A young Episcopal priest from Philadelphia was exhausted. He was just 30 years old, but serving the church through the tumultuous years of the war had taken a terrible toll on him. Members of his church had lost husbands, fathers, and sons in battle. Others had returned from war with physical and emotional scars.

Totally exhausted, the priest was granted a sabbatical by his congregation. During the fall of 1865 he traveled through Europe. In December he arrived in the Holy Land. Day after day, his soul was refreshed as he visited the places where Jesus had spent his earthly ministry.

Then, on Christmas Eve, he had an experience that would forever change his life. He rode all the way from Jerusalem to Bethlehem on horseback, a six mile journey. At dusk, in the dim light of the early evening, he approached the town where, long before, the Christ Child was born. Looking out over the City of David, he imagined what it was like for those whose faces shone around the manger on the night of our Savior's birth. Soaking in the whole scene, the young priest penned a poem in his journal.

The priest's name was Philips Brooks. A few years later his poem was put to music. It is now a favorite Christmas carol.

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie;

Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by.

Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light;

The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

A journey to Bethlehem on horseback changed the life of Philips Brooks. There, in the presence of Christ, he had a spiritual awakening. He returned to Philadelphia with new joy and enthusiasm for ministry.

Sisters and brothers in Christ, as you celebrate Christmas this year I want to ask you: *How will you get to Bethlehem?* I am not suggesting that you literally take a trip to the Holy Land, although that would be a great spiritual pilgrimage. I am asking how you will get to that place in your life where you behold the everlasting light that still shines amid the world's darkness.

My prayer is that during Advent and Christmas, you will journey to that place where you can step back, take a deep breath, and remember the reason for the season. Bethlehem can be a space in your home where you have devotions. It can be an event at the church, like the Journey to Bethlehem led by our children's department, or a gathering with Christian friends. It can also be a service of

worship. This season is filled with special opportunities to worship the Holy Child of Bethlehem, who still desires to enter into our hearts. I pray that, like Philips Brooks long ago, you will experience the Wondrous Gift given to us in the Holy Child of Bethlehem. He still brings hope, peace, joy, and love to all who humbly seek him.

Paul Cramer Leaves Legacy of Service, Giving

If you have ever visited or read books from the First Church Library, then you have experienced the generosity of the late Paul Leroy Cramer and his very dedicated service to our congregation.

An avid reader, Paul started the First Church library from the ground up and served as the librarian for 32 years.

"Paul liked to read and he liked books about religion, so he started the library," said First Church member John Behel. "He purchased all the books in the beginning, for others to read."

John and his wife, Jeannette, were close friends with Paul and provided care to him later in his life.

Sadly, Paul passed away in June at the age of 94. But Paul's faithful support of First Church will carry on long after him. Paul made a provision in his will to make contributions to both the Endowment Fund and the Building Fund through his estate.

Paul, a Mechanicsburg native, began attending First Church when he was in sixth grade. He formally accepted Christ at the age of 13, when he answered an altar call during a worship service. Paul's younger brother and sister followed him to the altar, and accepted Christ that day as well.

After high school, Paul joined the U.S. Army Air Corps and served on the European front during World War II. He received training as nose gunner for the Boeing B-17 bomber aircraft, and participated in at least 50 missions over Germany.

During the war, Paul prayed to God for protection and promised that if he made it home safely, he would dedicate his life to God. After four years of service, Paul did arrive home safely, and the rest of his life was based on keeping that promise.

Paul returned to his work as a barber. He opened a shop on South Market Street in Mechanicsburg, and operated it successfully for over half a century.

Paul also returned to First Church, where he gave generously of his time and talents.

Paul was a faithful member of the Guyer Sunday School class, and involved in many prayer groups and Bible studies over the years. Blessed with musical talent, he sang with the church's Adult Choir for 70 years! He also played the violin in the former Sunday School orchestra.

Paul was a man of humble means, but very generous in giving of both his talents and his resources.

When Rev. Shover, a former First Church pastor, heard of a wonderful new youth program, Paul financed the pastor's way to attend a workshop on it. The program was launched and became known as Wonderful Wednesday, a program that still runs today and has touched the lives of countless children.

Paul also inspired others to give. In 1962, the church's education wing was added and the kitchen was enlarged. Paul proposed to the Guyer Class that they furnish the new kitchen, borrowing the \$2,500 in funds if necessary. Instead, the class decided to raise the money by serving banquets for wedding receptions, church functions and other events. In total, their efforts raised \$5,000 for the kitchen.

According to John and Jeanette, regardless of what service or task Paul was completing for First Church, he never thought of it as a chore. He served cheerfully, and saw his work in the church as "joyful days."



Reflections for Lent—2016

If you have been studying "A Disciple's Path" with your Sunday School class or small group you have encountered the SOAP (also called SOAPY) method of scripture study and prayer. In 2016 we are going to apply this method to our annual "Reflections for Lent" devotional booklet. SOAP stands for Scripture, Observation, Application and Prayer (in which you Yield to God's will). Here's how it works:

- <u>Scripture</u>: Write down the scripture you have chosen to reflect on for the day.
- <u>Observation</u>: Write down what you believe the scripture says to you. What has the Lord impressed on you as a lesson?
- <u>Application</u>: Reflect on your observation and write what God has revealed to you personally about how this lesson applies to your life.
- <u>Prayer</u>: Write a prayer to God concerning this lesson and your life. Also write what you must yield in your life for this lesson to take hold in your life.

Here is an example (taken from "A Disciple's Path" workbook):

- <u>Scripture</u>: Your eye is the lamp of your body. When your eye is healthy, your whole body is full of light, but when it is bad, your body is full of darkness. Luke 11:34
- Observation: What I read determines the kind of light or darkness which will fill my mind and my body. I become what I think.
- Application: As I read this I became more aware that starting each day with scripture is important for me. If I begin my day with reading God's Word then my life will be changed to become more like Jesus as the readings shape my heart. If I miss a morning I feel a loss and a small amount of darkness comes into my life. The Word of God brings light into my life and makes me more useful to God.
- <u>Prayer</u>: Father, thank you for the gift of your Word. Thank you also for the light it brings into my mind and body as you teach and encourage me each day. I will not skip a day of this discipline because I need your light in my heart, mind and body. Amen.

The format of your personal devotional should be:

- 1. Brief Title
- 2. Scripture Just a short passage
- 3. Observation -2 or 3 sentences
- 4. Application about 5 sentences
- 5. Prayer -2 or 3 sentences
- 6. Your Name

After staring at the computer and hoping for divine intervention, I listened to some Christmas carols which put a smile on my face and made me eager to tell you about all the new Christmas books in the library ready for you to read now.

Every holiday there are authors that write novellas not only to celebrate the season, but also to give their readers shorter books to read during a busy season. Melody Carlson is always a favorite at Christmas because she writes with humor and poignancy. In **The Christmas Joy Ride**, eighty-five-year-old Joy has decided to sell her home and move into an assisted living facility near her sons in Arizona. When explaining this to her young neighbor Miranda, Joy mentions she is decking out her old

in Christmas decorations and driving herself from Chicago to Phoenix. Unemployed and facing foreclosure on her home, Miranda decides to pack a bag and go along on Joy's adventure. Even though there are some twists and turn on this trip, Ms. Carlson manages to make this an uplifting and inspirational read. Squeeze this book onto your Christmas to-do list.

The Amish embrace Christmas fiction with gusto. Barbara Cameron's **Twice Blessed** is two novellas. The first story, *Her Sister's Shadow*, identical twins Rosie and Katie Stolzfus work in an Amish business together and also own their own business preserving and selling food. From the outside the women seem equal partners in every way, but Rosie has always felt like the lesser of the two sisters. It will take a special man and a special business opportunity for Rosie to be the woman God has meant her to be. The second novella follows the twins theme with Mark and Ben Fisher, in *His Brother's Keeper*. Both men love the same woman, but it is Mark who wins her heart. A freak accident on Christmas Eve opens the door for Ben to become Mark and wed Rachel. Is making all his dreams come true enough incentive to become a man that deceives his wife and family? I won't spoil the

ending for you.

I have only mentioned two of the new Christmas fiction books in the library, but in December all of the library's Christmas books will be displayed for your enjoyment. The library also has many Christmas books containing true and inspirational writing from leading Biblical scholars.

Thanks to everyone that supported our mini book sale in November with either donations or purchases. Watch for new books purchased from the profits in 2016.



Facilities

Can you believe it? We're rapidly closing in on the end of 2015. Where has this year gone? It seems like just yesterday that I was writing about the Trustees exploring options regarding the sewage pumps that had malfunctioned at the end of September 2014, my hopes for completing the stair tread replacement project, our plans for updating the Education wing restrooms, issues with our heating system and the south parking lot, and a desire to replace the reach-in refrigerator in the church kitchen. Yes, it has been a busy year as we have attacked all of those issues and lots more in our efforts to maintain and improve the First Church facility.

First off, I wanted to provide an update on the plumbing issue on the lower level that arose just as I was writing the Facilities article for the November newsletter. As I suspected, it did turn out to be a clogged drain line between the restrooms near the kitchen and the sewage pit. The plumbers were able to resolve that issue and everything appears to be running smoothly for now.

Thank you to Jim Van Kirk for his assistance in installing Nightlock Lockdown devices on the classroom doors of the first floor of the Education wing. Little Friends purchased these devices, which are designed to allow the teachers to secure their doors in the event of an intruder in the building. We still have a couple of the devices to install on the classroom doors used by Little Friends on the second floor, and hope to have them completed by the time you read this.

Thank you also to Don Karns for installing a pane of Plexiglas in the door leading from the Youth lounge into the Faithful Families classroom area. Adding Plexiglas to that door enables our Youth Department to use that room for their Sunday evening 4G small group discussions in compliance with our Safe Sanctuaries policy.

I am pleased to report that the really large curbside tree in front of the church parsonage on Colony Road was successfully removed without causing any property damage. The timing of the tree removal was perfect, as it came down just before all of its remaining leaves started to fall, saving Pastor Keller and his wife Betsy from a lot of backbreaking work. Special thanks also go out to Tracy and Bob Wertz, Jr. for their efforts in landscape plantings around the parsonage. Very attractive!

Charlie Ryder's health has improved to the point that he is able to work with Matthew Canonizado in constructing a wooden cross to put the finishing touches on the prayer garden Matthew is creating on the Frederick Street side of the church near King Alley for his Eagle Scout project. Matthew still hopes to complete his project this fall before cold weather sets in.

I wish I could report that I've been able to cross off everything on my "to do" list but, surprise surprise, that isn't the case. There are still repairs to be made to the Frederick Street wall in the area above the balcony, so that area remains cordoned off for now. One of the spotlights above the choir loft still needs to be replaced. We need to get snow shovels and ice melt stationed by the church entrances as winter approaches, and also make sure all of the hand sanitizing units by our entrances are working properly. And I haven't made nearly enough progress on our initiative to modernize the control system for our 8 rooftop HVAC units.

I can't emphasize enough how important it is to alert me if you see something amiss or in need of our attention around the First Church facility. It's a big building and we can't be everywhere all of the time, so your eyes really help us in our efforts to be faithful stewards of this awesome place. Thank you.
