"Love *Anyway* and Love *Everyone*"

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear..." (I John 4:18a)

The other day as I waited at a stop light in downtown Mechanicsburg, I saw a little girl with a backpack just like the one our 4-year-old granddaughter Chloe has. It's bright purple, with the characters Elsa and Anna on it, from the popular Disney animated movie, "Frozen." As she walked by my stopped car, holding her mother's hand, I noticed that her mom was carrying an infant, about the age of our new granddaughter, Lilah. Mom was wearing a long, ankle length dress. Her head was covered with a bright red hijab scarf, a sign of her Islamic faith. From under the scarf, she was smiling, obviously enjoying her little ones.

As the light changed, and I pulled away, I thought about how grateful I am to live in a country that values religious freedom. I said a prayer that this young mom and her children, like our own family, would enjoy health and happiness. Too many people these days react with fear and even hostility toward those who are different from them.

Following the recent terrorist attacks by Muslim extremists in Paris and San Bernardino, I heard a report on the radio about the bullying of Muslim women wearing hijabs. It's happening in cities around the country. One of the women said that a man pulled up alongside of her car at a traffic light. He rolled down his window and yelled, "Terrorist! Go home!" Another said that her husband doesn't want her to wear her hijab in public anymore. He is afraid for her safety. A lifelong Muslim, she is heartbroken at the thought of denying her faith.

There are plenty of reasons to be afraid these days. ISIS and homegrown terrorism are among them. However, just because a few extreme members of a religious or ethnic group commit senseless acts of violence, it does not mean that we ought to be suspicious of everyone that is different from us. In this culture of fear and mistrust, we who represent Jesus in our community are called to bear witness to his way of love.

In his three New Testament letters, the apostle John calls us repeatedly to love one another. Then he explains, "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear..." (I John 4:18a) According to John, the opposite of love is not hate; it's fear. Fear puts up barriers. Love tears them down. Fear looks at others with suspicion. Love looks at others as God's children. Fear hides and keeps a distance. Love comes out in the open and builds relationships with others.

As we move into 2016, I am grateful to be part of a loving Christian community at First Church. My prayer is that love will be palpable in our life together and in the ways we reach out to all of our neighbors. Whatever the New

Growth is due in large part to a gift from the estate of Harry Hamsher and his wife, Norma, as well as estate gifts from Janet Miller and Paul Cramer. The fund also grew from the generous cash donations of several First Church members throughout the year.

Gifts to the Endowment Fund last forever. That's because contributions to it are never spent. They are invested to generate income for future use.

Reflections for Lent-2016

If you have been studying "A Disciple's Path" with your Sunday School class or small group you have encountered the SOAP (also called SOAPY) method of scripture study and prayer. In 2016 we are going to apply this method to our annual "Reflections for Lent" devotional booklet. SOAP stands for Scripture, Observation, Application and Prayer (in which you Yield to God's will). Here's how it works:

- <u>Scripture</u>: Write down the scripture you have chosen to reflect on for the day.
- <u>Observation</u>: Write down what you believe the scripture says to you. What has the Lord impressed on you as a lesson?
- <u>Application</u>: Reflect on your observation and write what God has revealed to you personally about how this lesson applies to your life.
- <u>Prayer</u>: Write a prayer to God concerning this lesson and your life. Also write what you must yield in your life for this lesson to take hold in your life.

Here is an example (taken from "A Disciple's Path" workbook):

- <u>Scripture</u>: Your eye is the lamp of your body. When your eye is healthy, your whole body is full of light, but when it is bad, your body is full of darkness. Luke 11:34
- <u>Observation</u>: What I read determines the kind of light or darkness which will fill my mind and my body. I become what I think.
- <u>Application</u>: As I read this I became more aware that starting each day with scripture is important for me. If I begin my day with reading God's Word then my life will be changed to become more like Jesus as the readings shape my heart. If I miss a morning I feel a loss and a small amount of darkness comes into my life. The Word of God brings light into my life and makes me more useful to God.
- <u>Prayer</u>: Father, thank you for the gift of your Word. Thank you also for the light it brings into my mind and body as you teach and encourage me each day. I will not skip a day of this discipline because I need your light in my heart, mind and body. Amen.

We welcome your participation with gratitude! Your reflection will strengthen your faith and the faith of others, plus it will bring glory to God! The format of your personal devotional should be:

- 1. Brief Title
- 2. Scripture Just a short passage
- 3. Observation -2 or 3 sentences
- 4. Application about 5 sentences
- 5. Prayer -2 or 3 sentences
- 6. Your Name

As I write this library article, the Christmas rush is still in full swing. But by the time you read this, all the advertising headlines will begin with "new" and sometimes "new and improved". That could be said of our library as we are always adding new books. For some of you that would describe the library in a nutshell. I am constantly surprised by the number of people that don't know about the library or what a treasure it is in our church. Not only do we offer the latest and best in Christian fiction, but our library also offers a comfy room to read or browse the shelves. Someone is on duty to look things up in the computer or help you find the genre for which you are looking. We offer extended checkouts and grace periods if you are late returning your book. You can also turn your teenager loose in the library as quality romance, mystery and other genres are available without explicit language or settings.

The new author in the library is Lis Wiehl whom you might recognize as a Fox News channel consultant. I have tried to read Ms. Wiehl's books for several years, but was put off by some of the super natural elements to her books. Her new Mia Quinn Trilogy mysteries have renewed my interest in her. Mia Quinn works in the prosecutors' office, is a single mother and a widow of a murder victim. Interwoven in the mysteries are situations that many families face every day. Just trying to hold down a high pressure job and keep the family as a priority will resound with most working parents. In the first book, A Matter of Trust, Mia is on the phone with a colleague when the woman is shot and dies while Mia listens in horror. Reluctantly Mia teams up with police detective Charlie Coulson to solve the murder. Second in the trilogy is **Deadly Business** which is packed from page one to the very end with action and suspense. If her work prosecuting violent criminals is not enough, Detective Coulson comes to Mia with evidence that her husband's recent death might not have been an accident. But will finding out the truth put her whole family in danger? Lethal Beauty concludes the series. The story is gritty with the death of a prostitute, the discovery of a Chinese human trafficking ring and the terrible discovery that Mia's own son is dabbling in steroid drugs. It will keep you reading well past your bed time. The extra plus is maybe Detective Coulson wants to move beyond friend status? Is Mia ready for all of this chaos? I will let you find out.

This is just one of the fine new series on the shelf. If you prefer Amish literature or romances or some other genre, come in and let us show you how to find your favorites.

Facilities

A new year is upon us and that means new opportunities to create a warm, welcoming environment at First Church in Mechanicsburg. We did some great things around the facility in 2015, like completing our stair tread replacement project, restoring the lower level of the building after the sewage pump malfunction late in 2014, replacing the natural gas service line into the building, modernizing three restrooms in the Education wing, making major repairs to the dishwasher, replacing the reach-in refrigerator, painting and reorganizing all of the kitchen cabinets, relamping the sanctuary and the tower hallway, repairing four minor roof leaks, supporting two Eagle Scout service projects, and installing Nightlock Lockdowns on all of the classroom doors used by Little Friends Nursery School during the week. Plus, we purchased a home at 524 Colony Road in Camp Hill in the spring of 2015 to serve as our new church parsonage, and readied it for Pastor Keller and Betsy's arrival as they began their ministry with us on July 1st. God has been very good to us, and I thank you for the support you have provided in helping us meet these challenges.

Unfortunately, there isn't any time to sit back and rest on our laurels because keeping this awesome place operational has us scurrying around here every single day. We are still in the process of completing wall repairs on the Frederick Street side of the balcony of the Sunday School auditorium, and then that area will receive a fresh coat of paint. We are exploring options for making the small restroom next to the Guyer Sunday School Class area more "senior friendly", and then that room will also be painted. I'm still looking for a safe way to change out the two spotlights above the choir loft. I need to get busy in finalizing a requirements statement that will lead to the replacement of the control system for our rooftop HVAC units, with the potential also for replacing the pneumatic controls for our boiler system. We are hoping to undertake a paving, resealing, and restriping project in our parking lots once we are confident that we have seen the last of the ground settling in the east lot. We are looking to replace our video surveillance system to improve our security measures around the building. We are also looking to make some video upgrades in the sanctuary and Sunday School auditorium to enhance our worship services. Our winter has been mild so far, but I imagine we'll be seeing some typical winter weather soon that will present its own set of challenges, particularly with regard to our roof. Hopefully we're in good shape facility-wise at the parsonage, but that could quickly change as well.

We really appreciate your ongoing prayers and support. We strive to be faithful stewards of God's great resource here in Mechanicsburg as we continue to spread God's good news to those around us. Thank you.
