"A demonstration of the Spirit is given to each person for the common good." (I Corinthians 12:7)

Preparing for our summer sermon series, I've been thinking about people whose lives have made a difference in my life. Parents and grandparents, children and grandchildren, pastors and parishioners, friends and teachers and pastors: it's a long list. I am so grateful for each of them! Not long ago I was driving past the Little League field where I played as a child and I remembered someone I hadn't thought about in years. Sheryl helped to coach the Carlisle National Eagles, the team I was on.

Even though she was never able to hold a bat in her hands or throw a baseball, she loved the game! Stricken with a childhood disease, she depended on a motorized wheelchair to get around. Her disabilities never kept her from being at every game. Even at ten years old I understood the obstacles she had to overcome just to be with us. The other coaches taught us how to play the game, but Sheryl taught us the value of being a team.

Someone said, "The best teams are made up of a bunch of nobodies who love anybody and serve everybody and don't care about becoming a somebody." Sheryl certainly modeled love and serving and humility and taught those on her team to do the same. She was first one at the field for practice and games, and the last one to leave. She enjoyed conversation with every one of us. There wasn't a player she didn't care about. She kept meticulous records and made sure we all got playing time, the good players along with the mediocre ones like me.

From the dugout Sheryl was non-stop chatter. She cheered. She scolded. She barked out constant instructions and endless encouragement. When one of her players made an error, she would tell us gently to brush it off and give us some sound guidance to do better next time. But woe to the referee who made a bad call, or to the coach of another team she had a disagreement with. She looked out for her team and we all had loved and respected her. We didn't always win, but we grew close as a team.

One summer evening, a decade after my Little League days were over, I was walking by the old field and saw that the Eagles, my former team, was playing. I sat down to watch and soon heard a familiar voice from out of the dugout. After the game, I looked in and saw Sheryl, her scoring pad in front of her like always. She looked up at me and smiled and said, "Hey Denny, I'm still at it!" Indeed, she was. Generations of Little Leaguers learned to play as a team from a woman in a wheelchair who loved and cared for them all. What a legacy!

This summer in our worship services, as we celebrate the gifts passed down to us from our earliest ancestors in the faith, I invite you to remember those whose legacy lives on in your life. If they are still alive, send them a note and tell them how much they mean to you. If they are no longer with us, say a prayer of thanksgiving for their lives. May all of us live our lives as a model for others.

### Penny Report ~ Now Located at the Sierra Leone Display in the Tower Hallway



Help support the Sierra Leone Well Drilling Project by dropping your pennies, or any loose change, into the *Change for Water* Bucket. One hundred percent (100%) of your donations are used to provide training and dig wells that supply safe drinking water for schools and communities in Sierra Leone. There were 2,367 pennies contributed this past month for a total to date of \$12,824.36.

### Sierra Leone Update

As you may know, we are supporting the rehabilitation of the parsonage at our sister church, Calvary United Methodist Church in Taiama, Sierra Leone. The parsonage will be used as the official residence for the District Superintendent who also serves as the lead pastor of the church. This building will be used for conferences and hosting of out of town guests visiting the area. Recent correspondence on June 7 from Bishop Yambasu states: "The current work on the Taiama parsonage is fantastic. I will be in Taiama tomorrow on my way to Bo for our Cabinet retreat. I will have photos taken and sent to you early next week. Many thanks for all your support."

A small team from First Church will be visiting Calvary Church in the fall to spend a few ministry days visiting the village, sharing meals, teaching Sunday School, documenting and reporting the progress on the parsonage and worshipping with the community. This visit will further connect our congregation to our brothers and sisters in Christ in Taiama. As part of that connection, we are asking for your help in several ways:

- Funding: we will hold a few fundraising events to support the team. These include a letter writing project to the congregation in Taiama where you will be asked to write a note about yourself and include a picture and a donation to the team to transport the letters. More details will be included in future newsletters. The goal is to make a personal connection to our brothers and sisters at Calvary Church.
- Dresses for girls: We are sending 50 tee shirt dresses for the church to distribute as needed. We are collecting tee shirts (small and medium) in pastel colors and colorful pillowcases for our First Church seamstresses to magically transform the shirts and pillowcases into a suitable dress for little girls. Watch for a collection bin for the tee shirts and pillowcases.
- Hats for boys: We are sending knit hats for the children handmade by our Covered in Love and Knit@Nite groups. If you are a knitter, feel free to join them in making the hats or donate yarn for the project.
- Prayers: We covet your prayers for the team in the planning of their upcoming visit. As the letter from our coordinator, Smart, in Sierra Leone states: "Thanks for your mail and your intention to come back home in October. We are more than happy to receive you. Pray that God's divine power will see you through the preparations."
- Check out the Sierra Leone Table in the Main Entrance hallway for updates and how you can get to know our sister church at Calvary. There will be an interactive display up by July 2, so that you can learn more about the people in Taiama.



First United Methodist Church,

As I sat in our barren living room, I reflected on the life change that had happened there throughout the past year. Here, there were many discipleship sessions, sexual purity meetings, weekly men's breakfasts, and times of prayer. This is also where LeeAnn and I shared many laughs, shed many tears, watched many movies, and ate too much ice cream. My feet hit the splintered 1930's hardwood floor, and I realized that this was the last time we would call this place our home. It was time to move out of 141 Sharpless Street.

God used the past year of full-time ministry with Cru as a confirmation for us. He confirmed that the decision to leave my job and work for Cru was the right one. For LeeAnn, He confirmed the call into ministry that she felt back in 2014 at Delanco Camp. These confirmations are all attributed to God's provision through your prayerful and financial support, and because of them, we have decided to serve long-term with Cru.

After moving most of our belongings into a local storage unit, we have begun house-hopping until we leave for a 6-week New Staff Training in Fort Collins, Colorado. Here, we will prepare for long-term ministry by being enrolled in the Institute of Biblical Studies. During IBS we will take two seminary courses, Intro to Christian Theology and Bible Study Methods. We will also be oriented to Cru's mission, learn how to sustain our ministry, and find out our ministry placement on or before June 30th. Finally, there will be a nationwide conference where 5,000+ Cru employees gather to hear about the vision for the ministry in the years to come.

As we make this transition, we want to humbly ask you to make it with us. Will you join us as we prepare to serve long term with Cru by continuing your prayer and monthly support? Words cannot express our gratitude for your intentional prayer and generous giving this past year, and we would love to continue our partnership with you.

New Staff Training runs from June 12th to July 24th, and will be held on campus at Colorado State University. The 6-week intensive training will be instrumental in preparing us for long-term staff with Cru. We've been asked to trust God to raise the necessary special gifts to cover the cost of our housing, seminary courses, travel, and other training expenses. In addition to your monthly giving, would you help us attend this training by giving a special gift of \$100, \$300, \$500 or some other amount?

After we are back, we would love to get together with you in person and share all the Lord has done this past year and what we are trusting Him to do in the future. We are overwhelmed by your generosity and how God has used you to confirm the call on our lives. It is a testament to His faithfulness, and we are forever grateful for it.








### Bethany Robinson Missionary in the Susquehanna Valley





### Breast Care Tote Bags Available to Comfort Patients

One out of eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime, according to health experts. Several women who attend First Church can attest to this firsthand.

In an effort to comfort and support those diagnosed with breast cancer, the First Church Health and Wellness Team has created Breast Cancer Tote Bags. The bags are packed with careful prayer and consideration, to include items that may be of help, comfort, and support for the women who receive them. Items include a journal, organizational binder, ice pack, stress ball, pill box, boho bandeau head scarf, and a hand-knitted item from the church's Covered in Love group. Each tote bag also contains a copy of the book, Jelly Donut Days by First Church member Michele Brymesser, a breast cancer survivor.

The Health and Wellness Team received a Health Ministries Grant from the Susquehanna Conference of the UMC to create a dozen of the bags.

University of Aberdeen theologian John Swinton said, "To belong is to be missed when you are absent." So what does it mean to for our friends who have disAbilities to fully belong?

### They fully belong when:

- They have access to every opportunity that other members of the church enjoy.
- They can hear about Jesus in a way that reflects their learning style, intellectual capability, and mobility needs.
- They build quality relationships, feel at home in the church family and are practicing their gifts for the good of church family and the world.

We all desire to fully belong. As we begin to accommodate the unique strengths and weaknesses of individuals having special needs, we will also create learning, worship and community environments that will be more welcoming to others who may struggle to belong for other reasons.

### Do You Know of or Have You Been Affected by Persons with this disAbility?

Polio is an viral infectious disease spread from person to person. In fewer than 1% of cases the virus enters the central nervous system, destroying motor neurons, leading to muscle weakness and acute paralysis. The focus of modern treatment has been on providing relief of symptoms, speeding recovery and preventing complications. The polio vaccines developed by Jonas Salk in 1952 and Albert Sabin in 1962 are credited with reducing the annual number of polio cases from many hundreds of thousands to around a thousand.
