At lunch with other clergy one day we were talking about traditions as we approached Holy Week and Easter. We took a side trip talking about Creasters, those that worship at Christmas and Easter only, and as clergy thinking aloud about the perennial challenge of how to engage the nominally religious before Easter morning. Someone then said, if you don't understand and worship through Holy Week, Easter doesn't seem like such a big deal. Imagine with me if you attend worship on Palm Sunday, celebrating Jesus riding a donkey into Jerusalem and the crowds happy and praising his name. Then come back the next Sunday, Easter to singing "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" and hearing the shouts of Hallelujah. That's why we need Holy Week, to understand that between those two celebrations a lot happens!!

During Holy Week Jesus upends tables and is frustrated with religious leaders and people. Jesus is betrayed by close friends and knows the heartache and pain some of us experience today when we have been betrayed by loved ones. Jesus has a meal with his disciples and eats with them in the Upper Room, celebrating communion together. Jesus prays alone in Gethsemane, a reminder of our need too for quiet time and discernment with God. Jesus is arrested, taken before the High Priest, mocked, questioned and judged. Jesus then walks carrying his cross and is crucified, like a criminal, and his body quickly placed in a grave before sun falls that evening. While Jesus' close friends and loved ones return to their homes grieving his death. A lot happens in a week!

I am looking forward to this year's Passion Play, a beloved tradition at First Church, where we get to see these events (and more) to understand why as Christians we will join on Easter to sing, "Up from the grave he arose...". Celebrating Easter changes when you know the week that Jesus walked from Palm Sunday to Easter morning, and the power of Jesus' sacrifice and love for us that we see throughout Holy Week. On Easter morning we come celebrating that death no longer holds thy sting, that Christ has forever taken away the power of death and through his resurrection promises "Christ has opened paradise, Alleluia!" for us all. May we continue the journey of Lent, walking beside Christ through Holy Week and truly understand the power of Easter morning.

## **From the Library**

Happy Easter! By the time you read this Easter will be three weeks away, and Lent is ongoing. If you are like me, you are busy planning Easter dinner, thinking where to hide the Easter eggs, and most importantly getting your heart ready for the blessings of Easter. The library has had a resurgence of interest in Biblical fiction and Janette Oke's latest book is *The Pharisee's Wife*. Set during the time of Christ, Mary is a young woman of great beauty and from a very poor family. When Enos, a rising Pharisee, spots her in the market, he sets his sights on making



her his trophy wife. Offering an extraordinarily large bride price for her seals her fate. That money is the only hope her parents have to escape their poverty. Yet marriage to Enos is all Mary feared. He treats her as his prize and sends her into training to be the proper Pharisee's wife. One misstep could send her to her doom, as he doesn't love her; he just wants to own her. And just as she fears life isn't worth living, she hears of a traveling Prophet. Both she and Enos's lives will be changed forever as Jesus comes into their lives. You won't want to miss this timely story of lives forever changed by our Savior.

*Hope's Enduring Echo* by Kim Vogel Sawyer is also historical fiction, but a little more recent set in the 1800's. Jennie Ward has taken over her father's job since an accident has left him unable to complete the task of inspecting a seven mile wooden pipeline. It is a lonely job, all by herself most of the time, she prays for a companion. During her trek along the pipeline, she discovers what looks like a very old

and odd shaped bone. Enter Leo Day, a paleontology student that wants to prove to his father that his studies are valid. He asks Jennie to be his guide and show him where she found this bone. He believes it belongs to an Allosaurus. If they can find the rest of the bones of this dinosaur, his father will surely approve of his son's career path. With Jennie's prayer answered for a companion, she struggles to keep up with her father's work and help Leo. She also feels that God has sent Leo for a purpose, and she wants to know what that means for her.

Both books are romances with the richness of their time and settings adding more than just a love story. I think you will enjoy not only the story, but also the underlining message of God's timelessness. Hope to see you in the library. The library will be closed on Easter Day so you might want to pick up and extra book or two on Palm Sunday.

Youth and adults interested in participating in a summer mission trip to assist in the North Carolina hurricane disaster relief can find more information on Church Center. \*Our youth summer trips over the past years have continued to be more intergenerational, so we would like to extend the opportunity to other adults in our congregation wishing to participate in a mission trip. Because of youth presence on the trip, all adults must have up-to-date safe sanctuary clearances. Priority will be given to students. We need to finalize our team soon and would love to have you along! Here are some answers to the most frequently asked questions:

#### Who are we going with?

Praying Pelican is an organization we have partnered with before that comes alongside the local church to offer help and support in the work they are doing in their community.

#### What will we be doing?

Some of that depends on the makeup of our team and what skills we bring to the table. It also depends on the community's needs and what disaster relief stage they are in when we arrive. We will serve and help in whatever ways we can. Disaster relief tends to be a more physically intense style of work and service.

#### How will we get there?

We will travel together in whatever vehicle arrangement is needed to transport the team and our

stuff. Usually, we have one or two rented vans and often a personal vehicle or two.

# What will we eat?

Praying Pelican, in conjunction with the church, will provide us with meals and we will assist in preparing them if asked or instructed.

# Where will we sleep?

Depending on the arrangements made by Praying Pelican we will be sleeping in a space where we can set up air mattresses, cots, and sleeping bags. Sometimes, these are private rooms (like a Sunday school room) with several people in one room or a large space divided up to make private sleeping areas for each gender.

The financial report for February shows income lagging expectations so far in 2025. Expenses remain lower than anticipated for this year, which is fortunate.

The church debt for the parsonage stands at \$38,637, and the belltower loan stands at \$37,327, following a principal and interest payment on the belltower loan this past month. We thank you for your continued generosity and prayers in support of First Church.

# Stain Glass Articles by Al Robinson



Over a period of time, I'm going to tell you about the meaning of symbols on the windows and where to find them. As your church historian, I know little about the people who donated them. They were faithful members and pastors of the First Church and some of the relatives who donated them are still members of the church today. As you look at the windows you will see that time has aged them. The trustees have a fund established to restore the windows and the cost estimates are significant. So as you enjoy looking at the windows, consider an extra gift to the church to help conserve them.

There are two "grapes windows" at First Church. The first is in the sanctuary on the right side of the stain glass window depicting Jesus and the little children. The second is on the second floor the sixth window from the Frederick Street entrance.

Grapes in the Bible are a symbol of abundance and prosperity and successful agriculture. The Bible reports in Numbers 13: 17-24 that when the two spies returned from the scouting trip into the promised land that they brought huge grape clusters carried on a pole between them as proof of prosperity there.

The Bible also talks about sour grapes. In Jeremiah 31:27-30 (NRSV), we read these words<sup>. 27</sup> The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed

of humans and the seed of animals. <sup>28</sup> And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the LORD. <sup>29</sup> In those days they shall no longer say: "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge." <sup>30</sup> But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge. Jeremiah states that the sins of the ancestors will no longer determine the plight of the people of Israel but what each person's own sins will determine what happens to that person. I think is true for us today.

Wine was important in Bible times because there was and is little water in Israel (about 7<sup>1/3</sup> inches of rain in a year around Jerusalem today). Wine was a part of daily family life and in celebrations in Bible times. Jesus' first miracle reported in John 2 was the turning of the water into wine and that the wine that Jesus made was the better wine. Because water was so scarce, the connection between grapes and wine and not keeping the covenant were would have been clearly understood by the Israelites in the wilderness. "You shall plant vineyards and dress them, but you shall neither drink the wine nor gather the grapes, for the worm shall eat them" (Deuteronomy 28: 39 (NRSV). In other words, if you don't keep the covenant someone or something else is going to eat your grapes and drink the wine that you grew or made!

Genesis 49:11 calls wine the "blood of grapes." This makes the symbolism of wine clearer in Matthew,

<sup>27</sup>Then he [Jesus] took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; <sup>28</sup> for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. <sup>29</sup> I tell you, I will never again drink of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." (Matthew 26:27 - 29) (NRSV).

Let us remember that when we take communion that Jesus poured out his blood for the forgiveness of yours and my sins. Let us thank God for the abundance he has given us and to remember to give to others from it.

# First Church Mission Moments...

Backyard Missions, or BYM for short, is a wonderful outreach from our church to the surrounding community where we take requests for chores that need to be done in and around people's homes. The process involves sending an email to the BYM Team with proposed dates/times and talents needed to complete the task and then watching how God moves through each of the responders. Most of the work focuses on spring and fall cleanup in the yards of our Mechanicsburg neighbors while some might involve simple household repairs or painting that the homeowner cannot complete on their own or has the resources to pay professionals. It can be a lot of fun and the results are always rewarding in themselves, a happy homeowner with an improved property.
